Reports of the Officers, Advisory Council, and Foundation

President

AAPG had a very good year in 2007–2008 and I am happy that I could give it my best effort. My involvement included 112 days traveling and attending meetings in Wichita, Kansas; Lexington, Kentucky; Snowbird, Utah; Corpus Christi, Texas; Abilene, Texas; Bakersfield, California; Houston, Texas; Roswell, New Mexico; London, Aberdeen, Athens, Ankara, Dubai, and Rio de Janeiro.

In addition, the president spent many hours at his computer writing columns and articles for publications, preparing agendas, making committee appointments, and responding to member inquires and issues.

I am the first president in several years who did not have an on-site employed assistant, so I am grateful for the considerable assistance provided to me by many on the AAPG staff in Tulsa. My spouse of 53 years, Marianne, a former English teacher, provided valuable editing advice and accompanied me on most of the trips. I may have missed selling or participating in some new oil and gas prospects during the year but I plan to catch up soon.

We were able to meet or exceed all but one of the 13 goals agreed upon by the Executive Committee. This was possible due to the dedication of all of the EC members, committee managers, committee chairs, and AAPG staff. This is the first year we had two vice presidents (VP of Sections John Armentrout and VP of Regions John Hogg) and two females (Treasurer Randi Martinsen and Elected Editor Gretchen Gillis) serving on an eight-member EC.

Highlights of the year are:

Five New Committees Appointed

1. Imperial Barrel Award

The Imperial Barrel Award Committee was established as a Standing Committee and had 35 teams competing in all 6 Sections and 4 Regions. Twelve teams, 10 from Sections/Regions and 2 "wild cards", competed at the San Antonio convention. The experience will be valuable to the students when they enter the Energy workforce. I congratulate Chair Connie Mongold and the entire committee and staff who worked diligently on the program all year.

Global Climate Change Committee
 A new standing committee, Global Climate Change, was appointed with twelve members, three recommended by each Division and three suggested

by the Executive Committee. The committee, with Priscilla Grew as

Chair, organized and presented a very informative and successful forum during the San Antonio convention. The committee is currently working on climate forums for the international conference in Cape Town and the next annual meeting in Denver.

Global Corporate Structure Ad Hoc Committee

The recently appointed Global Corporate Structure Ad Hoc Committee chaired by Marlan Downey has begun a study to consider recommending to the Executive Committee a new corporate structure for AAPG, which will help our growth internationally and reduce our liability exposure when operating globally. Recommendations may include extensive bylaw changes for consideration by the House of Delegates.

4. Ad Hoc Committee on SEC Response

This committee, with Peter R. Rose as Chair, was appointed to respond to the Securities and Exchange Commission's invitation for public comment on possible revision to the disclosure requirements relating to oil and gas reserves. This SEC action followed the June 2007 AAPG/SPE Multi-disciplinary Reserves Conference in Washington DC. The committee, working cohesively under a deadline, provided answers to 15 questions that were approved by the Executive Committee and posted on the SEC and AAPG web sites. During the last week of June 2007, the SEC issued a 172-page document proposing new rules for reserve reporting and once again asking for public comment within 60 days. At the end of the fiscal year the Ad Hoc committee was back in session, working on a response to the proposed rules.

AAPG/SEG Ad Hoc Committee on Geoscience Integration

Near the end of the fiscal year I appointed Lee Billingsley to chair a committee to work with a similar committee appointed by SEG to explore avenues of additional geoscience cooperation. AAPG's focus will be on developing the best geoscience for both memberships through cooperative efforts in international operations.

Global Development

AAPG opened its second branch office in Manama, Bahrain to better serve members in the Middle East and Asia and to support the biannual GEO conference in Bahrain. Abeer Al Zubaidi has been hired as director and an events manager will be hired. The first branch office in London has added events manager Lika Chambers to assist Director Steve Veal. The current EC will be considering options to open other branch offices.

The Corporate Advisory Board has been restructured and expanded to include members from five National Oil Companies: Aramco, Total, PetroChina, Statoil and Petronas. These new members will provide a global perspective for AAPG.

Geo-DC (GeoScience and Energy Office)

Geo-DC has proven to be effective in communicating AAPG positions to government officials and in bringing important issues to AAPG members. David Curtiss accepted the position of director in early 2008 and past director Don Juckett continues as a part-time consultant. David has authored eight letters of testimony to Congressional Committees that I signed with minor changes. Perhaps the most widely publicized was the June 23 letter to U.S. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi about access and leasing activity on federal lands and the Outer Continental Shelf with a perspective concerning the science and process of finding oil and natural gas.

The Geo-DC office helped organize the Congressional Visit Days, attended by 10 members in March 2008. Geo-DC has added a summary of legislation that is pertinent to the AAPG Position Statements posted on our Web site.

This year the Geo-DC Governance Board was changed to include 11 voting members and 4 non-voting observers. Patrick J.F. Gratton was appointed chair and has been the prime mover of the reorganization of the Board. The Executive Committee voted to extend funding for the Geo-DC through FY June 2011 contingent on annual review of impact and clearly defined metrics.

Petroleum Technology Transfer Council (PTTC)

AAPG has assumed management of PTTC. New bylaws have been adopted and a seven-member Board, consisting of four geologists and three engineers, has been appointed by the EC. Gene Ames was elected chairman. Alignment of the Regional Lead Organizations (RLOs) has been changed to closely follow Section boundaries. The RLOs have planned 76 workshops for 2008, several of which have been completed prior to June 30.

Membership and Member Services

In spring 2008 AAPG opened a "Career Center" on our Web site. The program is a job board, which allows employers to post notice of opportunities open and for members who are seeking employment or consulting work to post resumes. The EC approved this new member

benefit recommended by the Membership Career Services Committee, Clint Moore, Chair.

The membership application process has been simplified during the year. The applicant no longer needs to provide a transcript of college credits, but must attest to the accuracy of degree(s) earned. As of June 2008 sponsor forms may be completed on line and returned by the click of a mouse button.

On June 30, 2008, after one-year dues-delinquent members were dropped, total membership was 30,225, which is an increase of 51 over the previous year. Full members (Active, Emeritus, Life and Honorary) decreased by 160. Eleven student chapters were added bringing the total to 168 (83 in the USA and 85 International). Development of corporate membership will be emphasized in the coming year.

Program Re-investment

AAPG has experienced a budget surplus in each of the last two fiscal years, thanks to the current oil boom. Although we recognize the need to maintain an adequate reserve fund to cover the possibility of a future downturn, the EC voted to transfer \$175,000 to the Foundation as an endowment to provide earnings to expand the Distinguished Lecture program. Matching funds will be solicited to enlarge the endowment.

I have thoroughly enjoyed serving as your President and look forward to seeing many of you at future meetings of the world's greatest geoscience organization, the American Association of Petroleum Geologists!

Editor

The number of manuscripts submitted to the *Bulletin* dropped slightly in 2007–08, but manuscript quality remains consistently high. In calendar year 2007, 131 manuscripts were submitted, compared to 146 in 2006. Of the manuscripts received in 2007, 38% were

accepted for publication with revisions. The average number of days required to review and act on manuscripts remains low—88 days from submittal to decision rendered in 2007.

In calendar year 2007, 75 papers were published. Published papers were authored by geoscientists around the world and included 60 (80%) regional studies and 15 (20%) topical (nongeographical) studies. Of the regional studies, 31 (41%) of the papers addressed subjects from areas in the United States, 14 (19%) from the Asia/Pacific area, 6 (8%) from Latin America, 4 (5%) from Europe, 3 (4%) from Africa, and 2 (3%) from the Middle East; no papers were published on Canada.

We continue to seek more contributions to the E&P Notes section of the *Bulletin*. A theme volume about the Barnett Shale, edited by Ronald J. Hill and Daniel M. Jarvie, was published in 2007. Several theme volumes are in preparation.

In addition, general geologic papers that have a high potential to assist petroleum geologists with finding and producing more oil and gas were published as contributions to the Geologic Notes section, and papers addressing current technical methodologies that have potential application to reducing petroleum exploration risk, to enhancing hydrocarbon recovery, and to reducing field operation and reservoir production costs were included in the Geohorizons section of the *Bulletin*.

The *Bulletin* is part of an elite group of high-impact journals whose citations are tracked. The 2006 Impact Factor (IF) for the *Bulletin*, calculated by Institute of Scientific Information, a division of Thomson Scientific, is 1.553. With this IF, the *Bulletin* was ranked in the following subject categories:

- Energy and Fuels: 10 of 62
- Engineering, Petroleum: 1 of 21
- Geosciences, Multidisciplinary: 44 of 131 The *Bulletin* also ranks highly for Immediacy Index, a measure of how quickly published articles are cited, and Cited Half-Life, an indicator of the archival value of journal articles. These three measurements demonstrate that the *Bulletin* serves both geoscientists active in the oil and gas industry and academicians and researchers.

Advisory Council


The AAPG Advisory Council (AC) held three meetings in 2007–2008. The two obligatory meetings produced recommended nominees for AAPG officer candidates and annual awardees.

The AC also met in early February 2008 in joint session with AAPG's Executive Committee (EC). The main topic of the extra meeting was AAPG's Strategic Plan.

Actions by the AC are summarized, as follows:

The AC elected chairmen of two internal committees, Honors and Awards and Officer Nominations. Traditionally these chairmen were past-presidents of AAPG, but with the encouragement of Patrick J.F. Gratton and Peter R. Rose, this year's chairs were not past-presidents. Jim McGhay served as H&A chair and Randy Ray served as Officer Nominations chair. The rationale for these open elections is to reduce any appearance of imbalanced influence from past-presidents.

- The AC sent two recommendations to AAPG's EC on the topic of petition candidates.
- First, in Article II, Section 11 of AAPG Bylaws, the AC recommended changing the current deadline of October 15 for petition candidates to present signed petitions to August 31. Rationale for the change is to encourage petition candidates to attend the numerous regional and sectional meetings that occur in early fall.
- The second recommendation refers to the same Bylaw as above. In addition to submitting 50 signatures, at least 20% of members that sign the petition must be affiliated with at least two Sections or Regions other than the petition candidates home Section or Region. Both recommendations need action by the EC before being presented to the House of Delegates.
- The joint meeting on AAPG's Strategic Plan illustrated the importance of the science of geology to AAPG. The discussion loosely followed the search for a common answer to three questions in the book "Good to Great." The questions are: What are we passionate about? What are we the best at? and What are our financial drivers? The science of geology provides the best fit as the common answer to all three questions. Both the EC and AAPG staff seemed renewed toward focusing on geology in future strategic plans.
- The AC recommended revisions and clarifications to the Outstanding Explorer Award.
- The AC recommended criteria for the new Robert R. Berg Outstanding Research Award, which will be first presented in 2009.



As chair of the AC, I thank members for their participation in our important processes. Also, I want to thank the AAPG staff, specifically Regina Gill and Janice Scott, for providing the AC with the support needed to accomplish the tasks this year.

Foundation

The AAPG Foundation mission is to provide a source of funding to support educational, charitable and scientific objectives that directly and indirectly benefit the geological profession and the general public.

The Foundation's financial audit is currently in progress and these results are considered preliminary. The investment portfolio increased by \$180,000 during the fiscal year primarily due to the diversification of the Foundation portfolio which includes public and private mutual funds, international investments and real estate. The investment portfolio of the Foundation amounted to \$34.7 million and net realized capital gains of \$1.4 million as of June 30, 2008.

For fiscal year 2007–2008, the Foundation had total gross revenues of \$1.9 million which came primarily from rental income, interest, dividends and capital gains, oil and gas royalties, and the OTC grant. Total expenditures for Foundation operations-excluding grants and awards-was \$1.3M resulting in a surplus from operations of \$603,750. Contributions to the Foundation in 2007–2008 totaled \$1.9 million. Approximately, 13 percent of AAPG

members contributed to the Foundation through their AAPG dues statements.

During the past year, the Foundation continued support to many of the valuable geological programs it has support over the years as well as some new programs including: Distinguished Lecture and Visiting Geoscientist Programs, AAPG Bulletin, Energy Resource Library, L. Austin Weeks Undergraduate Grants, K-12 Education Programs, and Digital Products University Subscriptions. Total disbursements for grants and program services were \$1.3 million compared to \$816,054 in the prior year.

The Grants-in-Aid program continues to grow with 70 Named/Memorial grants and eight additional grants established but not yet fully funded. This year, two new Named Grants were endowed and provided additional funding by Allan V. and Eleanor Martini and David W. Worthington. Grants were awarded to 115 graduate students, domestic and international, totaling \$208,000 through the Grants-in-Aid Program.

The L. Austin Weeks Memorial Medal was established in 2008, and is the Foundation's highest award, given in recognition for extraordinary philanthropy and service directed to advance the mission of the AAPG Foundation. The premier award honors the late L. Austin Weeks, whose philanthropic legacy set an exemplary standard.

Marta Weeks was the first recipient of the Week's Memorial Medal Award. She was presented the award at the AAPG annual meeting in San Antonio.

Jack C. Threet was the tenth recipient of the Chairman's award for his long-time outstanding support and exceptional service to the Foundation, and he accepted his award at the Chairmen's Reception in San Antonio.

At the annual meeting of the Members of the Corporation in San Antonio, David Campbell, Robert Esser, Robert Weimer, and M. Ray Thomasson were re-elected members of the Foundation Corporation.

The Board of Trustees, joined by Larry Funkhouser and Jack C. Threet, Co-Chairmen of the "Meeting Challenges...Assuring Success" Financial Campaign and Campaign Team Leaders Bob Ardell, Mike Party, Ed Picou, and Marta Weeks united to kick-off the public phase of the campaign at the AAPG Annual Meetings Opening Session in San Antonio announcing a \$35 million goal.

The AAPG Foundation Trustee Associates membership totaled 264 as of June 30, 2008. Officers elected at the previous year's meeting in Maui included Paul Strunk, Chairman; Jerry Namy, Vice Chair; and Jay Henthorne, Secretary/Treasurer. This year's meeting was held in Jackson Hole, Wyoming in early September. Nine new Trustee Associate members were added during the current year and nine members passed away. The Trustee Associates support has been, and continues to be, a critical and important factor in the growth and development of the Foundation.

The Board of Trustees extends a heartfelt thank you to each contributor for continued support of the Foundation's vision and mission—together we can Meet Challenges and Assure Success for many years to come.

Reports of the Divisions

Energy Minerals Division

The mission of the Energy Minerals Division is to "advance the science and technology of energy minerals in an environmentally safe manner" by producing high-quality publications and by organizing and hosting technical sessions, workshops, field trips and the EMD Web site. While doing so, EMD moves closer to accomplishing an

important goal-to be the premier source for information and professional development in the EMD commodity areas of coal, coalbed methane, energy economics and technology, gas shales, geospatial information and remote sensing, geothermal, oil sands, oil shale and uranium. Basic information on these technical fields can be accessed by members on the EMD Web site at http://emd.aapg.org/.

Goals and Achievements for 2007–2008

EMD established six main goals for the 2007–2008 business year: enhance the EMD Website for each commodity area; increase EMD visibility in the Sections (and Regions); advance EMD projects further along toward publication; increase EMD membership; appoint new Councilors for International Regions; and recruit EMD vice

chairs for upcoming meetings. Significant progress was made on each of these goals, which will be discussed below.

Major achievements during the year were: having an unprecedented presence at the San Antonio meeting; adding an Atrican Region Councilor and changing the Bylaws to include Councilors from all six international Regions; increasing membership and our bank account; renaming the student grant in honor of the late Don Towse; recommending three active members to the Global Climate Change Committee; reaching an agreement to co-host the 2009 Perkins Conference on Unconventional Resources; and submitting manuscripts on two long-term projects to the AAPG Publications Department. In addition, we changed the way we conduct business by initiating focused conference calls involving small interest groups and urged EMD Councilors and Chairs to develop a grassroots network of volunteers at the level of the affiliated Societies.

EMD Website

Visitors to the EMD Web site should have recognized numerous improvements made over the course of the year. EMD committee chairs and councilors have embraced the new guidelines created by former Web site Chair Creties Jenkins to standardize report content and material to be posted. Also, councilors and committee chairs established a grassroots network of volunteers at the affiliated Society level to provide them with resource extraction data and information on current activity. Consequently, significant new material was added to the members only section.

Visibility in the Sections

EMD leaders and other volunteers ensured a strong EMD presence at all Section meetings. Our strategy here was two-fold: to have an EMD officer speak at the opening session or all-convention luncheon; and to help organize strong technical sessions that were listed in the program as EMD-sponsored sessions. The general chairs of two of the six Section meetings invited the EMD president or his designated replacement to participate in the opening session, and other General Chairs allowed an EMD officer to speak during the all-convention luncheon. Progress also was made toward our goal of having EMDsponsored sessions at all Section meetings, due largely to active involvement of local EMD volunteers.

Publications

Significant progress was made on moving several long-term projects closer to final publication. Matthias Grobe submitted the manuscript for the EMD/DEG publication, *Carbon Dioxide Sequestration in Geological Media—State of the Art,* to the AAPG Publication staff late in the year. EMD and DEG are both contributing \$5,000 toward publication costs, and the Texas Bureau of Economic Geology graciously contributed \$20,000.

The manuscript on Gas Hydrates: Energy Resource Potential and Associated Geologic Hazards, edited by Art Johnson and Tim Collett, also was received by the Publications Department and is in publication. This will be published as a CD with a paper copy of abstracts only, and could be available by mid 2009 at the earliest, the end of 2009 at the latest. Support for publication costs has been provided by the AAPG Foundation (\$12,000) and U.S. Department of Energy (\$20,000).

The second edition of the Atlas of Coal Geology (AAPG Studies in Geology 45) needs to be approved by the AAPG Publication Department before a manuscript can be submitted. Alex Papp is the EMD Editor of this book, which is co-sponsored by The Society for Organic Petrology. The AAPG Foundation has provided \$6,000 toward publication costs.

Work was suspended on the CD-ROM publication *Geospatial Technology Applications for Exploration and Production of Petroleum*, Samuel Limerick, editor. Instead, our focus shifted to a new project to develop a comprehensive geospatial database for the entire United States, beginning with coalbed methane and shale plays. Attribute data to be collected have been determined, as well as pilot areas in which to begin collecting these data.

Comprehensive energy commodity reports prepared by EMD committee chairs were compiled into a single article titled *Unconventional Energy Resources and Geospatial Information: 2006 Review,* published in the scientific quarterly journal, *Natural Resources Research.* A comparable report will be prepared this year under the guidance of Peter Warwick and Doug Peters. EMD columns on geothermal, energy economics, coalbed methane and EMD activities at the 2008 AAPG Annual Convention were written for the AAPG *Explorer.*

Membership and Finances

Our membership is on the rise, and financially we remain quite strong. EMD

membership as of March 1, 2008 was up 64 members from the same date last year, bringing total membership to 1,407. Our bank balance at the end of the second quarter of FY2008 was \$179,048, an increase of \$5,366 from the fund balance at the end of the 2007 fiscal year. We are well situated to continue to expand our activities in the coming years.

International Councilors

During the past 15 months, EMD has expanded its international presence by appointing Barry Goldstein as the initial councilor for the Asian/Pacific Region; Abelardo Sanchez Araiza for the Mexican, Central American and South American Region; John Dolson for the European Region; and Jeff Aldrich for the African Region. A Bylaws amendment was written to reflect EMD's desire to have all regions and sections represented on EMD's Leadership Council. The proposed amendment was approved by the EMD Executive Committee and current Councilors before being presented to the membership at the annual EMD business meeting in San Antonio for final approval. Prior to this, the Bylaws only provided for a Canadian Region Councilor and one other International Councilor for the rest of the world.

EMD Presence at Domestic and International Meetings

EMD achieved a significant accomplishment at the annual convention held in San Antonio by hosting an unprecedented number of technical sessions, poster sessions, workshops, and a field trip.

With this performance, EMD Vice Chair Donna Balin, along with Mike Wiley and Amy Sullivan, issued a clear challenge for organizers of the 2009 meeting in Denver, but EMD Vice Chair Laura Wray and her volunteers have accepted the challenge and will attempt to match, or perhaps exceed, the EMD exposure we enjoyed in San Antonio.

Global Climate Change Committee

President Will Green appointed three persons recommended by EMD to the new Global Climate Change Committee. One of the three, Jeff Levine, has assumed a very active leadership role, so active in fact, that he resigned his position of councilor for the Southwest Section in order to focus his efforts on committee work. Mike Party has assumed the duties of Southwest Section councilor.

Jeff Levine was a key player in the organization of the highly successful Climate Change Forum hosted at the San Antonio meeting, and currently is involved in planning a similar session for the AAPG International Meeting in Cape Town in October.

Joint EMD-GCSSEPM Technical Meeting on Unconventional Resources

Norman C. Rosen, Executive Director of the Gulf Coast Section of SEPM, on behalf of the Trustees of the Gulf Coast Society for Economic Paleontologists and Mineralogists Foundation, extended an invitation to EMD to be a co-sponsor of the 2009 Bob F. Perkins Conference on Unconventional Resources. The conference will be held in early December 2009 in Houston.

EMD's Executive Committee and leadership heartily endorsed our participation in this event. EMD members should consider submitting an abstract in any of the unconventional areas to be part of the technical program, including shale gas, tight sands, tar sands, gas hydrates and oil shale.

Towse Award

In March, the EMD leadership requested that the AAPG Foundation Board of Trustees consider changing the name of the "Energy Minerals Named Grant," created to provide scholarships to students, to honor Donald F. Towse. During an April meeting, the Board concurred, and renamed the grant the "Donald F. Towse Memorial Grant-in-Aid."

Honors and Awards

During the annual EMD Luncheon held April 23rd in San Antonio, EMD recognized members who have distinguished themselves through their service to the division and by the quality of their technical presentations. Andrew R. Scott was awarded EMD Honorary Membership; Walter B. Ayers, EMD Distinguished Service Award; William A. Ambrose, EMD Past President's Award; and Stephen M. Testa and Creties Jenkins, EMD Certificates of Merit.

The Best EMD Paper Award went to B. Rostron and S. Whittaker for their talk "Geological Characterization for the IEA GHG Weyburn-Midale CO2 Monitoring and Storage Project: Past Successes and Future Challenges." President's Certificates for Excellence in Presentation

(oral) were awarded to T. Engelder and G. Lash for "Crosscutting and Abutting Joints: A Reflection of Joint Normal Effective Stress," and to J. Schieber for "Deposition and Sequence Stratigraphic Framework of Late Devonian Black Shales in the Eastern U.S."

The Best EMD Poster Award was given to M.S. Cameron, F.E. Walles and D.M. Jarvie for "Quantification of Thermal Maturity Indices and Relationships to Predicted Shale Gas Producibility: Gate-way Visualization and Attribute Technique." President's Certificates for Excellence in Presentation (poster) went to R. Loucks and S Ruppel for "Shell and Grain Layers in the Barnett Shale; Event Deposition of In-Situ Accumulations?" and D. Streit, C. Dacre, E. Wemmelmann and C. Joyce for "GIS and Remote Sensing for "Crade to Grave" Hurricane Impact Assessment."

Election Results

Three new officers were elected for 2008–09. The new members are Frank E. Walles, President-elect; Andrea A. Reynolds, Vice President; and Amy E. Sullivan, Secretary. These three will join Creties Jenkins, President; and Neil Sullivan, Treasurer, on the Executive Committee.

Charles M. Boyer II (Eastern), K. David Newell (Mid-Continent), Genevieve Young (Rocky Mountain) and James G. Clough (Pacific) were elected as Section Councilors.

Division Of Professional Affairs

The Division of Professional Affairs (DPA) is the community within AAPG that focuses on the professional practice of energy resource geoscience, and upholds the AAPG Code of Ethics. As such, DPA forms the "inner core" of AAPG that makes it a *professional* society and not just a *scientific* society. The Division is proud to form that "core," and invites all AAPG members to join.

The DPA community consists of geoscientists who are committed to standards of competence, to ethical behavior and to professionalism—a commitment expressed through certification. The community comes together to improve members' knowledge of issues affecting the

practice of our profession. The DPA comes together to guide all AAPG members to improve their knowledge and practice as well.

DPA members actively inform themselves and all AAPG members about the externalities that impact our profession, particularly government legislation and regulatory policy. They represent their profession in engaging with lawmakers and regulators regarding matters of professional practices and professional concern.

Membership and Internal Affairs

DPA is the largest of three AAPG divisions with just under 3,000 members. We have had a few new members, but not as many as we should. The aging membership of the Division is a concern for this and future years, with over 60 percent of membership over 55 years of age. The Division is moving forward to address this. Please come join us in our support of professional development and affairs!

The Division's new membership level of Board Level Certification has been implemented, with an ongoing web-based system to track all of our members' continuing education activities. Please visit it and see, and use it! Get Board—Certified!

DPA continues its affiliation with National Assocation of State Boards of Geology (ASBOG), the group that sponsors the testing for most of the 28 U.S. states that have registration of geoscientists. And we are interacting with other professional and certifying organizations (SIPES and AIPG) on mutual projects. We co-sponsored the Third International Professional Geology Conference, held in September 2008, and presented several papers there.

The Division is financially strong, with net assets of some \$971,000. The current budget shows expenses of about \$178,000, with similar revenues.

During the year, the draft Business Plan compiled by the President was extensively discussed, especially at the midyear meeting. These discussions are the basis for multiyear planning for the Division's activities. The President also compiled the functions of Division committees for the Procedures Manual, and defined two new committees, a Website Committee to renovate and expand the services offered at the DPA Website; and a Liaison Committee to reach out to our sister certifying professional bodies (SIPES, AIPG, and GSL) and plan and carry out joint projects.

Government Affairs

The Division, through its Government Affairs Committee (Carl Smith, chair) is highly active in many areas, In particular, Carl has fully participated in the continuing successful development of the Geoscience and Energy Office in Washington, DC (GEO-DC), in conjunction with the AAPG Governing Board of GEO-DC. DPA's sponsorship and participation in this office has been reauthorized and DPA's financial contribution has been expanded for the coming year.

The revised AAPG Statements that guide all our efforts in government affairs have been in place. Furthermore, we now have a developed and approved a procedure in place to regularly review and update these statements, and add to them. Topics for additional statements on oil shale and oil sands development have been proposed and are being considered; other ideas are welcome.

The DPA has also successfully participated in the Congressional Visits Days (CVD) in early March, The newly formed Washington Advocacy Group (Deborah Sacrey, chair) worked with the GEO-DC office to field a record number of dedicated professionals to interface with our elected representatives and their staff. Plans are underway to participate in a "Geo-CVD" this fall, which can focus on geoscience and resource issues instead of the pan-science mode of past CVD.

The DPA has also been represented with a booth at the National Conference of State Legislators, held in Boston in August 2007. This was the first time we had a presence "on our own" at this important meeting of state-level legislative staff.

Ethics and Education

The DPA provides short courses on ethics. A one-hour luncheon overview was given by the President the

Mid-Continent and Gulf Coast section meetings, as well as at the Dallas Geological Society's TechFest and the May SIPES Convention in New Orleans.

The new Distinguished Ethics Lecturer was chosen and will be making presentations at Cape Town and elsewhere. The procedure for selecting and funding these lecturers was defined; the AAPG Ethics Committee (composed of DPA members) is given the leading role in selection.

We are also developing web-based ethics short courses based on past and present presentations.

The Reserves Training Committee under Dan Tearpock has been very active. They are developing courses, which can be offered online to enhance the abilities of geoscientists in reserves estimation.

Conventions and Publications

We sponsored a full program at the San Antonio convention in April. We co-sponsored the Monday forum on Discovery Thinking, hearing from some of the legendary veterans of the industry. We were the sole host for Tuesday's panel presentation and discussion on Policy and Labor issues. The DPA luncheon on Tuesday featured Elizabeth Ames Jones of the Texas Railroad Commission. We also sponsored and hosted four sessions of David Abbott's successful short course "Professional Ethics and the Geologist" with 128 registrants. Planning is under way for Denver 2009, with topics so far including "peak oil", the carbon economy, and reservoir engineering for geologists.

At Section meetings, the President represented the Division at the Mid-Continent, Gulf Coast, and Southwest Sections; personal matters forced him to cancel at the other three section meetings and the European Region meeting.

We have several publications initiatives. The DPA newsletter, *The Correlator*, has been expanded and upgraded by Bob Shoup, with the addition of sections on "Science Under Attack" and "Professional Development." Three issues were published online and in print. The newsletter is now being e-mailed to members and is available through the members only section of the DPA-AAPG website. Hopefully the newsletter will grow as a vehicle for informed debate and news on all topics of professionalism.

Awards Presented

At the DPA Awards Dinner held in San Antonio, the awards were presented: a Certificate of Merit to Robert Lindblom; the Special Award to Don Juckett; the Heritage Award to Ray Thomasson; the Distinguished Service Award to Bob Shoup; and the Live Member Award to Lee Gerhard.

Reports of the Committee

Astrogeology

The purpose of the Astrogeology Committee is to provide AAPG members a forum for ideas on astrogeology and its relationships to terrestrial geology and issues. Efforts include organizing symposia at AAPG and other earth science meetings, recommending speakers for distinguished lectures, encouraging technical sessions and field trips on astrogeology at AAPG meetings, and acting as liaison with groups having similar interests, such as NASA and other geological societies. The committee encourages digital and/or paper publications on astrogeology. All who are interested in astrogeology, planetary science, and their application to energy, environmental, and other resource issues are invited to join the Astrogeology Committee.

Goals of the Astrogeology Committee include arranging an annual program of symposia or poster sessions at AAPG conventions that emphasizes all aspects of astrogeology and its direct and indirect application to the exploration for energy (or other) resources, including their evaluation and production. The Astrogeology Committee also seeks to extend similar programs to AAPG International Conferences, develop and implement an annual K-12 or teacher-outreach activity, either at an AAPG-sponsored meeting or at a similar venue.

The primary goal for the 2008–2009 business year is to produce a workshop in advance of a special publication on the extraterrestrial exploration for energy resources. The workshop and a special publication, "Energy Resources for Human Settlement in the Solar System and Earth's Future in Space," are envisioned as a comprehensive and integrated review of energy resources in the Solar System, including materials that could both sustain future human expeditions and settlements as well as meet Earth's energy challenges in the twenty-first century and beyond. The three main themes of the workshop and special publication are (1) providing a source of energy and materials for Earth importation, (2) seeking cost-effective manufacture of propellants for human exploration of the solar system and transportation systems in space, and (3) sustaining and supporting human

habitation and colonization of the solar system.

The Astrogeology committee expanded its membership in the 2007–2008 year by adding new members Cynthia Dinwiddie, Seiichi Nagihara, Prasanta Mukhopadhyay, Michael Campbell, Tom Klekamp, and welcoming associates Brad Jolliff and Dante Lauretta. For the 2007-2008 year Harrison Schmitt and William Ambrose served as Co-Chairs. We are pleased to announce that exploration geologist and former Space Shuttle astronaut Jim Reilly will be the new committee Co-Chair along with William Ambrose in 2008–2009. Charles Sternbach and Brian Pitts, who served as Co-Vice Chairs in 2007-2008, will continue to serve as Co-Vice Chairs in the upcoming business year. Starting in 2008, the co-vice chairs will have staggered terms. Ronald Hart was AAPG staff liaison, and Don Clarke served as committee manager. Bob Lindblom was Committee Oversight liaison, with Ted Beaumont serving as AAPG EC liaison.

Committee co-chairs Harrison Schmitt and William Ambrose co-chaired the session "Return to the Moon: Research, Resources, and Rewards" at the 2008 Annual AAPG Convention in San Antonio. Cynthia Dinwiddie and Darrell Sims at the Southwest Research Institute also co-chaired the session "Astrogeology: A Far-Sighted Look at Unconventional Resources." The Astrogeology Committee is also sponsoring two sessions, "Sub-Continental Scale Layered Intrusives and Lunar Mare Structures" and "Snowball Earth and Planetary Climate Change through Time," and a field trip to the Bushveld Complex at the 2008 AAPG International Convention in Cape Town. The Astrogeology Committee also co-sponsored a session "Current Research Issues in Lunar Stratigraphy" at the 2008 Annual GSA meeting in Houston. Doug Peters, coordinator for astrogeology sessions at the 2009 AAPG Convention in Denver, has arranged a variety of activities. Tom Klekamp will serve as the Astrogeology vice chair for the 2010 Annual AAPG Convention in New Orleans.

In 2007, the Astrogeology Committee launched its Web site. Among the items posted on the Web site are: mission statement, goals, business plan, list of committee members and responsibilities, calendar of events, AAPG convention activities including recent and currently planned technical sessions, field trips and

forums, abstracts, presentations, and calls for papers. Committee Oversight

The Executive Committee of AAPG authorized the formation of a Committee on Committees (CoC) in 1991 and Paul Strunk was its first chair. The original purpose of the CoC was to "recommend to the President-Elect a slate of candidates for standing, special and ad hoc committees; Association representatives to other permanent groups and all other appointments on which the Executive Committee, the President or President-Elect request advice." The "purpose" of the committee has changed somewhat over the past 17 years through direction and counsel from the various presidents and Executive Committees in place during this time. However, the committee continues to serve the President and President-Elect as to concerns relevant to the various committees of AAPG established each year. This is currently achieved by assigning members of the committee as liaisons to specific AAPG committees. Following the contact and discussion with the chairs/vice chairs of these committees, an evaluation form with a number of questions relative to that committee's meetings, special needs, any requested help, and its performance is filled out by the member. The forms are submitted to the chair/ co-chairs and to Linda Burris, AAPG Information Systems Database Administrator, in Tulsa. They are reviewed and assembled by the chair/co-chairs and

forwarded to the President-Elect by July 1 of each year.

In 2005 following the AAPG annual meeting in Calgary, the name of the Committee on Committees (CoC) was changed to the Committee Oversight Committee (COC).

The COC currently has 18 members with Bob Lindblom and Ed Heath serving as Co-chairs and Vice-chairs Mark Wilson and Bob Countryman. COC members serve three-year terms with optional reappointment for additional three-year terms.

For the year 2007–2008 the Executive Committee (EC) established 41 standing committees and 2 ad hoc committees. Except for a few standing committees, COC members were assigned specific committees as liaison for evaluation. The completed forms were then compiled and submitted to President-Elect and now President Scott Tinker.

Co-chair Bob Lindblom had the privilege of attending the 27th annual AAPG Leadership Conference held August 17–19, 2007 at the Keystone Lodge in Keystone, Colorado. This annual conference included over 200 attendees from all facets of AAPG including the superb planning and assistance of AAPG staff personnel.

The COC met at the annual meeting of AAPG on April 22, 2008 in San Antonio, with nine members attending plus one alternate.

Results of this meeting included a review of the minutes, prepared by Recording Secretary Lee Avary, of the 2007 COC meeting held in Long Beach, California and the COC annual report (2006–2007) prepared by Chair Bob Lindblom; the Leadership Conference held in Keystone, Colorado in August (referenced above); receiving a number of completed liaison forms from attending members and comments relative to the evaluation form. There was a review of COC member terms as to reappointment or leaving the Committee. Relative to this item, seven members agreed to reappointment and George Bole will step down from the COC after 12 years of exemplary service. His initiative and positive work ethic will be missed. There were also specific comments on needs and concerns of some of the evaluated committees. Other issues addressed were relative to the annual meeting of the COC and its interface with the new committee structure during the coming year.

On a personal note, I would like to say that it has been a privilege and pleasure to serve as Chair and Co-chair of the COC during the past four years. The tenure has offered many challenges and experiences but with equal rewards. I will continue as a member of COC and look forward to working on any expanded tasks and responsibilities assigned in the coming year.

Finally, and most importantly, a special thanks to all the COC members for their propitious efforts in performing their liaison work with AAPG committees and the timely submittal of the evaluation forms.

Distinguished Lecture

The Distinguished Lecture Committee functions as an arm of AAPG that provides lecturers speaking on important and timely topics in the field of their expertise. The outstanding lectures provide knowledge transfer between the Association, affiliated societies, and academia and serve the educational needs of its members. The committee's key strategies are to (1) identify topics that support the business decisions made within the exploration, development, and production groups, (2) showcase the state-of-the-art technology and concepts used in both the oil and gas industry and in academia, and (3) cooperate with other societies supporting joint lectures and bringing local societies into a common forum.

The committee nominates and selects speakers for Fall and Spring lecture tours. The committee currently consists of 17 dedicated professionals. More recently, it also identifies and selects instructors for the Distinguished Instructor Program. Based on the success of the 2007–2008 season and the speakers for 2008–2009, the committee continues to maintain a high caliber and balanced roster of lectures that demonstrate a breadth of science to wide audiences.

The fifteen 2007–2008 American Distinguished Lecturers gave a total of 265 talks, reaching an audience of 7428 students and society members around the world. The two Distinguished Instructors, one North American and one International, toured in the 2007/2008 season. Each

gave his/her short course four times to a total audience of 165 people. AAPG and SEG rotate responsibility for the AAPG-SEG Inter-Society Distinguished Lecturer. In 2007–2008, AAPG coordinated the international tour for Don Lawton. The slate of Distinguished Lecturers for 2008–2009 has increased to a total of 20 for the year and it looks to be a very successful year so far. As usual, each speaker will have a very hectic schedule as he/she endeavors to broaden AAPG's impact in the geosciences.

AAPG appreciates the support demonstrated by the companies and universities in providing the resources required for the development of presentations and for the extended periods of absence from the office for the Distinguished Lectures' and Instructors' tours

We are pleased the significant support from the AAPG Foundation has continued as a result of major contributions to the Distinguished Lecture Fund establishing named lectures such as: the Allan P. Bennison International Distinguished Lecturer; the Haas-Pratt Distinguished Lecturer, funded by Merrill W. Haas; the Roy M. Education

The function of the Committee is to stimulate and quide a viable education program by setting goals, guidelines, and directions which satisfy changing needs in continuing education; by recommending subjects for the changing needs in continuing education; by recommending subjects for the Association's catalog of short courses, schools, field seminars, training seminars, course note series, and related education activities; recommending speakers and program leaders and their fees; advising AAPG leadership on education matters, reviewing proposals relating to continuing education.

Long-term goals of the committee

- Continue to quantify and describe AAPG's educational niches and develop a coherent curriculum that capitalizes on current niches.
- Expand the existing education program, based upon recognized market needs, balancing the potential financial risk of new globalized programs with proven domestic, economic courses.
- Globalize the education program, adding courses initially in the Middle East and the UK and ultimately in other parts of the world, utilizing the expertise in international offices and/or international societies.
- Increase interaction with other AAPG committees, sister societies, and other commercial entities where appropriate.

Action Items

Bulleted items indicate year-end status.

- 1A: Place matrix of existing courses using logical themes and skills level on Website and with education calendar in 2008.
 - Finalized matrix (Phase 1) was used for course planning in 2008, 2009, and 2010
- Develop a new curriculum, filling "gaps" in existing matrix. October 2007
 - Committee was asked to list
 Future Course Topics with possible
 instructors; this will be an ongoing
 task for the committee reflecting
 changes in course offerings to
 meet industry needs.

- 1C. Develop metrics at each October meeting by which programs can be assessed with respect to competitive courses, economic value, incorporation of emerging technologies/ methodologies, and participant feedback.
 - Completion of matrix (Phase 1) occurred at the April 2008 committee meeting; we still will solicit comments from instructors of current courses who can provide feedback on course prerequisites and level of proficiency required by attendees.
 - The committee recommends that the AAPG Education Department provide logistical support for field courses in order to avoid losing those profitable and popular courses to other organizations that do provide logistical planning for the instructors.
- 2A: Develop Fall 2008, 2009, and 2010 Education Themes and course ideas
 - Fall 2008 Education Conference on Structural Geology developed and advertised.
 - Fall 2009 Education Conference will have a business theme with topics such as finance and the industry, marketing and sales in the energy sector, risk management, reserve determinations, and other topics.
 - Confirmed acceptance by the 2009 Convention Committee for the slate of short courses and field trips that the Education Department will offer
 - Consider asking John Lorenz to offer his fracture short course that he ran earlier this year in Denver
 - Susan Nash will draw up a list of possible proposals to present to funding or grant-making organizations that would utilize AAPG strengths together with new interactive, web-based worlds and graphics, with the goal of providing education for targeted constituencies (earth science teachers, K-12 earth science students, etc.). This could be a focus for the new subcommittee.
 - Consider offering a course at the 2009 AAPG Convention in Denver to teach methods for utilizing various online software (such as Elluminate, Neulio, Flickr, Adobe Connect, Picasa, Hot Lava!) to create effective presentations, share information, and to train/ inform employees, investors, partners, and other constituencies

- Develop a synchronous online courses that are based on AAPG assets; in other words, prepare materials that are of interest to AAPG members in a variety of formats that can be accessed online.
- Courses cost about \$1,000 each to develop
- An example of one possible topic involves what the petroleum scientist needs to know about Wall Street?
- Fall 2010 Education Conference will feature unconventional reservoirs.
- Possible topics include: seismic characterization of reservoirs; borehole imaging/petrophysics; tight gas sands; coalbed methane; gas hydrates and geothermal resources; geomechanics/pore pressure; case studies in shale gas; core workshop; fractures in unconventional reservoirs.
- Develop "scouting" network for overseas courses and increase international representation on committee. 2007–2008
 - Two new members with international connections have joined the committee: John Kaldi (Australia) and Joe Lambiase (Asia region).
 - AbeerAl Zubaidi, Director of the Bahrain office, will submit the name of an education representative from the Middle East Region to serve on the committee
 - Two new student members with international connections have joined the committee: Sushanta Bose and Andres Ruzo-Callejas.
 - The committee recommends the formation of a London education subcommittee to initiate and sustain regional training programs.
 - International training can be included with Hedberg Conferences and SEPM Research Conferences (note that SEPM does not have a training committee so that is a niche for AAPG).
 - AAPG has met with PetroChina who has strong interest in the Hedberg Conferences
 - Distance learning opportunities are particularly suitable for international courses. AAPG should consider the SEG model featuring a slide show with lecturer and subtitles in any language.

- AAPG must determine which educational topics are most important for the international market.
- 4A. Coordinate with local committees for Denver 2008 & 2009 meetings.
 - The committee has forwarded four short courses and one fieldtrip to the 2009 Convention committee:
 - Risk Analysis
 - Regional Stress and Geomechanics
 - Interpretation of Old DSTs

Grants-in-Aid

The purpose of the AAPG Foundation Grants-in-Aid program is to foster research in the geosciences by providing support to graduate students in the earth sciences whose research has application to the search for and development of petroleum and energy-minerals resources, and to related environmental geology issues. A comprehensive and rigorous application and review process identifies the most deserving applicants who are eligible.

This year the Foundation approved an increase from \$2,000 to \$3,000 for a maximum grant. The number and total dollar amount of grants is constrained of course by funding made available by the AAPG Foundation. This comes in the form of Restricted and Named Grants, and regular funding.

The 2008 application class completes the 52nd year of the AAPG Foundation Grants-in-Aid program. The program is one of the most competitive and prestigious funding programs in the earth sciences.

Awards Summary

Student submissions and committee reviews were completed online, for the fourth year, in 2008. We have continued to make adjustments and improvements to the online application process. The overall quality of student applications has steadily improved. For the Committee, the online review process has facilitated greater input (i.e., through comments, etc.) and continued broadening of the committee's demographics. It is simple, accessible, and convenient. The online review process is an extremely valuable tool for the efficient and effective implementation of the Grants-in-Aid Program.

The committee received 236 applications from schools in 13 countries for review this year. Total applications for 2008 were down 51 from the previous year. Increasing the number and demographic diversity of applications will be focus areas for the coming year.

Monetary awards, totally 116 or 49% of the application pool, were made to the top scoring eligible applicants. A total of \$210,000 was granted. Restricted and Named Grants were again awarded this year to the top scoring, eligible applicants. The average grant was \$1,810, the highest to date. This will increase significantly next year when the maximum award is increased from \$2,000 to \$3,000.

One hundred eleven doctoral candidates and 125 master's candidates applied for grant funds. The final grant award population was 51% doctoral candidates and 49% master's candidates. The committee mission statement describes a one-third doctoral and two-thirds master's ratio. This has proven difficult to adhere to while maintaining the overall quality of award winning applications. A proposal to relax the ratio will be submitted to the Executive Committee in the coming year.

Forty-three percent of the applications received in 2008 were from non-U.S. citizens. Seventy-two percent of the applicants are attending schools within the U.S. However, 81% of this year's awards were made to US schools and 19% to non-U.S. schools; Australia (1), Bulgaria (1), Canada (9), China (3), United Kingdom (8), and United States (94). We are researching ways to increase the international visibility of the program.

Funding

Of the total \$210,000 awarded, \$127,750 was provided by the

Foundation Grants-in-Aid Fund and \$82,250 was from AAPG Foundation "Named Grants" honoring institutions and distinguished AAPG members. Three new named permanently funded grants were established within the AAPG Foundation and made available for the 2008 award year: the Ike Crumbly Minorities in Energy Grant, the David W. Worthington Grant and the Alan and Eleanor Martini Grant.

The Grants-in-Aid program continues to seek avenues to connect students and AAPG members. Increased coordination with other student related committees is being accomplished principally through the SFCC monthly phone conference. We also hope to increase awareness of the Grants in Aid program among the AAPG members, sections, associated societies and affiliated societies. By identifying awardees to their home societies we hope to facilitate recognition, communication, and collaboration between the membership and the future membership of AAPG, building upon the AAPG community.

The 2008 grant awards were announced at the AAPG Annual Convention in San Antonio and are available on the AAPG Web site at http://foundation.aapg.org/gia/current_recipients.cfm. Abstracts of the funded research of students who received grants in 2008 will be published in electronic form in AAPG Search and Discovery. Publication of the abstracts increases the visibility of the Grants-in-Aid Program, provides prestige and publicity to award recipients, and informs the membership of student research being supported by the Foundation.

Committee

For the 2007–2008 program year, the committee was comprised of 44 members with representation from the following countries: Australia, Canada, Mexico, Netherlands, Norway, Saudi Arabia, Ukraine, United Kingdom, and U.S. We will continue to broaden the demographics of the committee through international recruiting.

Many people deserve recognition for their role in making the Grants-in-Aid Program a success in 2008: the AAPG Foundation and individual donors for their generous financial contributions; committee members, for thoughtful review of applications and their suggestions for improving the program; and the AAPG Foundation staff who are responsible for administration of the Grants-in-Aid Program. We were pleased to welcome Angela Taylor of the AAPG Foundation to the Grants-in-Aid team this year. We wish

to thank you all for your contributions, and your dedication continues to uphold the excellence of the AAPG Foundation Grants-in-Aid program.

International Regions

The mission of the International Regions Committee is to represent AAPG international Region members by advising the EC, AC and HoD on ways to promote AAPG as an international organization. Such counsel includes enhancing international membership, increasing services and benefits to international members, and providing a forum for interaction between international Regions, U.S. Sections and AAPG committees, to review and recommend international education initiatives and international conferences, to identify and recommend international candidates for AAPG honors and awards and elected offices.

Background

The IRC represents Canada, Europe, Asia-Pacific, Africa, Middle East, Latin America, within which are widely divergent cultures and languages. Approximately 35% of AAPG's total membership (and 22.5% of the active membership) is within IRC oversight and these Regions offer the best opportunity for dramatically increased membership given the overall number of geoscientists working in the global arena. International meetings have steadily grown in attendance and are an important part of AAPG's strategy to grow

globally. However, in many of these Regions, AAPG's presence is minor or secondary to the SPE, SEG, EAGE, PSGB, SEAPEX and PESA which often provide much more local activity and perceived value. The IRC committee is charged with finding ways to energize and assist the Regions to grow activity and their presence, thereby increasing membership and helping to achieve the AAPG business objective of being "indispensable" to geoscientists globally.

Summary

With the exception of Africa and Latin America, who are wrestling with how best to structure their organizations with committed volunteers, the Regions (Canada, Asia Pacific, Europe and Middle East) are performing self sufficiently with regards to the following programs and initiatives: membership growth, DL and VG programs, student chapters, newsletters, Websites, inter- and intra-regional meetings, HoD representation and awards within their regions.

However, understanding revenue models (and who holds the purse strings) and representation on the relevant standing and ad-hoc committees (where the regions can provide sound input and accrue benefits for their members) are issues that need to be resolved.

2007–2008 Summary of Activity

- John Kaldi finalized a proposal for a financial model for the regions. These will be part of the 2008 regions budget cycle.
- Membership growth plans will be presented by each region at 2008 Leadership Days.
- Regions have considered the Regions Advisory Board recommendation and have tailored the concept to their local needs.
- 4. The regions considered implementing local award schemes, but nothing concrete has yet come of this.
- Region leaders encouraged their affiliates to have more AAPG-badged events (e.g., speakers, VGP, DL's).
- Each Region was to nominate a local Region Education Coordinator to contact universities, make arrangements for VGP and DL visits, and be the Region's liaison for student chapters. Some progress; to be completed in 2008.
- 66% of Regional Delegates managed to attend the HoD meeting in 2008. This was a record attendance, but lower than the outstanding 97% attendance from the domestic sections.

- Europe, Asia Pacific, Canada, and Middle East have averaged 75% attendance over the last three years, but Africa has struggled below 40%, and Latin America below 10% in the same period.
- Each Region was to set up
 e-newsletters and establish
 user-friendly local websites. All regions
 (except Latin America and Africa) either
 have, or plan to have a regional
 newsletter in the next 12 months.
- A monthly schedule of Region teleconference calls was established and is working well.

2008-2009 Goal

- 1. Peter Lloyd, John Kaldi, Chuck Caughey, Chris Heine, and Carol McGowan have reviewed membership of the various AAPG standing committees, HoD committees and the Division leadership councils, to assure that international members are suitably represented. Fifteen AAPG standing, HoD and Division Committees have been identified where it is critical for the Regions to fully support. Region leaderships are now soliciting volunteers to fill the gaps, and hope to have completed this phase by Leadership Days in August. The Canada Region is to be congratulated in completing this task already! The EMD and DEG have been strongly supportive and opened positions on their leadership boards for regional councilors.
- Peter Kahn, Debbie Nishida, Janet Brister and Carol McGowen will screen the regions' websites and assure that regional newsletters are readily accessible, and that contact, coordination and committee responsibilities are clearly identified, with linkages to the e-mail addresses for the appropriate contacts.
- Vice Chair Peter Kahn will follow-up to assure that the regions meet deadlines in providing lists of officer candidates (December 1) and award nominations (April 1) from the regions to the AC.

Other Issues

- International Conference and Exhibition (ICE) meeting schedule: Africa-2008, Latin America-2009, Asia Pacific-2010, Canada-2011, Middle East-2012, Europe-2013. The ICE standing committee is responsible for determining which Affiliate(s) we partner with for the ICE conferences, and in which cities they are held.
- 2. The Imperial Barrel Award is proving very successful and motivational for

students. There is an IBA standing committee to manage this initiative.

Preservation of Geoscience Data

The mission of the AAPG Committee on Preservation of Geoscience Data is to promote collection, preservation, and utilization of samples and cores as well as those data directly attributable to this rock material to include core analysis, sample descriptions, and stratigraphic assignment. Specifically inclusive, would be photographs, petrographic data and descriptions, photomicrographs, porosity, permeability and other rock data all of which could be digitized and stored in compact storage facilities. A priority is placed on identifying established repositories and constructing automated linkages between potential users and the data listings of these archives. The Committee will encourage and support both the AAPG membership and any other individual or appropriate organization in accomplishing this mission.

Notice Of Meeting

An invitation to attend the committee meeting was mailed from AAPG Headquarters to the Directors of all Geological Surveys along with 50 copies of the recently printed "Preservation of Geoscience Data Brochure". Invitations were also sent out to persons who had attended the meeting in prior years. The committee met with 32 persons in attendance during the course of the meeting.

Our guest speaker was
Tammy Dickinson, U.S. Geological
Survey, Program Coordinator, National
Data Preservation Program. Her
presentation was followed by a short
10-minute PowerPoint presentations by a
diverse group of individuals from around
the country who serve on the
committee. It included persons with

experience and non-experience, young and mature, federal, state, and university personnel, a wide geographic area, and representing both large and small organizations. Discussion concerning goals for our committee for the coming year followed these presentations.

It was very interesting to learn what approaches various surveys are using in a time of budget cuts for everyone. We can learn from each other by sharing our knowledge and ideas. Questions were addressed, subjects like: Are you reinventorying you entire collection? What type of database are you using? Are you discarding material that you are unable to identify? Are you adding new collections? How are you storing your holdings? Are you photographing your holdings?

The purpose of our committee is to promote collection, preservation, and utilization of Geoscience Data. It was a good opportunity to meet some of the people working with Geoscience data. Discussions like this provide an opportunity to learn and develop contacts with others having similar challenges. It was also a good opportunity for persons attending to meet other people involved in preservation efforts in various states.

Two hundred copies were also sent to David Curtiss, Director, AAPG Geoscience and Energy Office, to be given out during a meeting in Washington, D.C. Tammy Dickerson, USGS also received 200 copies, along with Bill Harrison, Western Michigan University. Bill was planning to give copies out during a PTTC workshop. Copies were given out to everyone attending the committee meeting and were also available at the AAPG bookstore.

Oral Presentation

I gave an oral presentation on behalf of the committee at the Geologic Society of America Annual Convention in Denver. Topic Area: Geoscience Data for Geoinformatics. My paper was titled "Guidelines in Developing a First Rate Geoscience Data Repository."

International Visitor

Daljit Sing Dhaliwal, with PETRONAS, Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia attended a meeting in Houston. He contacted me concerning a visit to Kentucky to see our well sample and core library. Publication Pipeline

The mission of the AAPG Publication Pipeline Committee is to improve geoscience education in countries abroad by providing used geoscience books and periodicals at no cost to libraries that request them.

The function of the Publication Pipeline Committee is to collect donations of geoscience books and periodicals and to forward them to overseas universities and libraries. Publications are donated by retired or deceased geoscientists and

company libraries. The books and periodicals are cataloged, boxed, stored and then distributed when a recipient university is identified. These publications are shipped with the assistance of AAPG members, student chapters, affiliated societies, and companies with overseas operations. When necessary, the committee applies to the AAPG Foundation for funding to ship these materials. To date the committee has shipped nearly 60 tons of publications.

Accomplishments-Fiscal Year 2007-2008

As in previous years, this last year was a successful one for the Publication Pipeline both in terms of intake of publications as well as the amount of publications sent overseas. Highlights include:

- Intake of publications—38 donations with a combined weight of 7 tons (2 tons in Tulsa)
- International shipments to universities included shipments to Papua New Guinea (PNG), India, and Iraq with a combined weight of 2 tons. The committee is also working on pending shipments to Argentina, Malaysia, Nigeria, Thailand, and Vietnam.

Equally important, this last year the committee set a goal of getting more AAPG members involved, especially in-country members and student chapters who can help facilitate and ensure an efficient donation program as well as collaborating with other AAPG committees and programs. Examples of collaboration and communication with other committees/societies include:

- PPC members Chuck Caughey and Martin Cassidy coordinated with Barry Goldstein and Mick McWalter in the Asia Pacific International Region and the Petroleum Exploration Society of Australia, in arranging the PNG shipment, which turned out to be one of the more difficult places on earth to send books. John Kaldi, co-chair of the International Regions Committee was also involved with this donation.
- Chuck Caughey is also on the Student Focus Coordinating Committee (SFCC), chaired by Bill Houston, and liaises with the Student Chapter (SC) Committee chairman Rhonda Welch and with Student Affairs Coordinator Mike Mlynek. Both the SFCC and the SC committees are broadening from a domestic focus to a more global perspective. Coordinating with these groups played a critical role with the initial shipment to Indonesia. Chuck is also working with the International

- Regions Committee to help get geoscientists to visit campuses overseas (Visiting Scientist Program) that in turn can help us get our publications to the students that need them.
- The committee contacted the Chairmen of the International Regions regarding collaborating with members in different regions on PPC activities. The pending shipment to Nigeria would not be possible without the collaboration and assistance of AAPG members Kunle A. Adesida, KehindeLadipo, and Nigerian Association of Petroleum Explorationists. The assistance of Herman Darman, president of the Asia Pacific region, has been extremely helpful with the pending shipment to Malaysia.
- The committee is also in contact with Linda Musser of Penn State University and the Alliance for Earth Sciences, Engineering, and Development in Africa and John Hogg of the Canadian Society of Petroleum Geologists regarding collaboration on PPC activities
- Martin Cassidy contacted the Geological Society of America, Northern California Geological Society, the Los Angeles Basin Geological Society, and the Coast Geological Society regarding collaboration with the PPC on PPC activities
- The committee has been working closely with AAPG staff in Tulsa to update our committee Webpage and to begin the process of transferring the committee's records and communications to digital format using the Association's SharePoint and Webmail technologies. Converting to digital format will greatly improve the committee's efficiency and help us better achieve our goals. A partial inventory of holdings has been put on the Publication Pipeline Webpage which is reached through the AAPG website. This list of our holdings can be viewed and downloaded from the Web page (www.aapg.org/ committees/pubs_pipeline).

Future Activities

Our most urgent problems are identifying universities that need the publications and finding AAPG members who are close to the recipient universities and are willing to work with the Publication Pipeline in arranging receipt of publications as well as locating companies and or organizations who can underwrite shipment costs. As in years

past, special emphasis will be put upon getting more AAPG members involved, especially in-country members and student chapters who can help facilitate and ensure an efficient donation program. This type of collaborative effort has worked well in the past and is our model for success in the future.

Publications

The mission of the Publications Committee is to assist the Association's Elected Editor by soliciting important topics for publication and assessing suitability, market appeal, and timeliness of proposals for AAPG's special publications and the Bulletin.

The AAPG Publications Committee has continued to solicit, review, and process proposals for publications as AAPG Special Publication volumes. Reviewers (committee members) have contributed to revisions of proposals that have strengthened the final texts and made sure the volumes are related to hydrocarbon geology that is relevant to the AAPG membership. The Publications Committee received and reviewed nine proposals this year.

The chair, vice-chairs, and staff have maintained a schedule of monthly teleconference calls to assess the progress of each project, and helped shepherd various authors along the paths towards completion of projects. Seven approved print projects and eight approved digital projects have been moved into production.

One of the initiatives that continued to bear fruit is the "Getting Started In..." series. Each unit in this series consists of a collection of 10-15 seminal and important published papers that have been collected by an expert in the field, with introductory text for the volume and a brief synopsis of each paper. The

following "Getting Started In..." digital publications were released this year:

- Getting Started #8—Thrust Structures and Tectonics
- Getting Started #9—Strike-Slip Tectonics
- Getting Started #10—3-D Seismic Technology
- Getting Started #11—Sequence Stratigraphy

The AAPG Publications Committee is always looking for good geology texts to publish, either in hardcopy, digital, or hybrid hardcopy-digital formats.

The review and approval process has been streamlined, and we have cut significantly the time between submittal of final manuscripts and final printed publication release. In fact, we are currently anxious to replenish the pipeline as projects are completed.

The following titles arrived at AAPG HQ for production and were released during the 2007–2008 year:

- Studies 56—Atlas of Deep-Water Outcrops
- Hedberg 3—Understanding, Exploring, and Developing Tight-Gas Sands

In addition, there are 5 print publications currently in production scheduled for release in the 2008–2009 year as well as several digital publications, with another 19 projects, both print and digital, approved by the Committee and in preparation by various authors and editors due to be received at AAPG HQ to start production during the 2008–2009 year.

Student Chapter Committee

The mission of the Student Chapter Committee (SCC) is to support the establishment and ongoing efforts of AAPG Student Chapters at academic

institutions. To this end, the SCC will act as the primary liaison between AAPG and it's student and faculty members. Within AAPG, the SCC will be a leader in establishing programs that will promote student membership, facilitate student involvement in the greater organization, and provide students with exposure to research and careers in the petroleum, energy mineral and environmental sciences. The SCC will strive to maintain an active, diverse membership that represents a broad disciplinary and geographic distribution of professionals, thereby providing a valuable resource to students as they transition from academics to professional careers. The committee should maintain an international co-chair or vice-chair and apply for foundation funding for specific needs.

Committee Structure

The Committee increased its membership from 30 to 41 members, further diversifying the group by age and geographic location. Our membership currently includes 4 international members, 2 students, and 7 early career (0-3 years) professionals. An additional 6-9 members will be added this year, with an emphasis on increasing international and student representation. The committee leadership has been expanded to include three Vice Chairs who will divide responsibility for supervising domestic chapters (Vice-Chair: Richard Ball), international chapters (Vice-Chair: Joy Roth), and annual meeting programs (Vice-Chair: Joe McShane).

Highlights

The Student Chapter Program was highlighted at several events during the 2008 San Antonio Convention.

Over 400 students, faculty and industry representatives attended the AAPG/ SEPM Student Reception, sponsored by ExxonMobil. Representatives from SEPM and the AAPG Visiting Geoscientist Program were also in attendance to network with faculty. The annual Student Field Trip was fully subscribed with 41 students registered for the event. This was a one-day, pre-meeting tour of the Lower Cretaceous Carbonate Geology of the Edwards Plateau, San Antonio Area. The annual Student Short Course was attended by 29 students and was entitled Seismic Expression of Structural Styles: A Modeling Approach.

Due to generous corporate support, student registration for the field trip or the short course was \$35. Students registering for both events were charged \$50.

At the 2008 San Antonio Convention 15 students participated in the AAPG Student Poster Competition. Fifteen students also participated in the AAPG Student Oral Competition. For the oral competition, student presentations were dispersed among the regular technical sessions. Judges' scores showed that the student presentations were often on par with their professional counterparts.

The inaugural Student Chapter Leadership Summit was held in September 2007 in Houston with seven U.S. chapters in attendance. The objective was to bring highly active and less active student chapters together to interact, share experiences, and brainstorm on ways to increase the effectiveness of student chapters/members throughout the country. This event received positive feedback. The second annual SCLS is scheduled for August 2008.

The SCC continues to administer annual programs, while also embarking on a series of initiatives for 2008–2009. Initiatives include:

- Growing and diversifying committee membership.
- Improving communication with international and local student chapters.
- Developing strong ties with student oversight committees and student program representatives in all international regions.
- Supporting student programs at international meetings.
- Commencement of a direct contact initiative with all student chapters.

Visiting Geoscientist Program

The Visiting Geoscientist Program (VGP) introduces students to career paths and shows them how to prepare for their future in geology and geophysics. Interaction with faculty and administrators also provides guidance regarding courses and field experiences needed by students to land jobs and become effective geoscientists. This also fosters a positive image of geoscience professionals and demonstrates advantages of active participation in AAPG.

Arranging VG visits entails connecting VG volunteers with students and

university officials worldwide. Over the past year, the VG Committee expanded to include one designated VG coordinator in each of the six AAPG Domestic Sections and six International Regions (total of 12). Other committee activities include:

- Recognition of Visiting Geoscientists: Distinctive embroidered "AAPG Visiting Geoscientist" shirts were prepared and distributed to active VGs. Ribbons identifying Visiting Geoscientists are distributed at AAPG meetings, and other forms of recognition are being considered.
- Visiting Geoscientist Tours: The Committee is planning to start with one domestic and one international VG tour next year, expanding the program in the future.
- Short Courses: These were received enthusiastically by students as an option for some Visiting Geoscientists.
- Communication: Work is under way to update and improve the appeal of the VGP homepage on AAPG.org.
- 5. VG Visits:Visits increased from 47 to 63 for 2007–08, exceeding the goal set by the AAPG Executive Committee. All AAPG U.S. sections were well represented by VG visits, and active VG programs have been established in most International Regions. Africa and Latin America will complete this global coverage, as energetic local coordinators have initiated Visiting Geoscientist programs in those areas.

Visiting Geoscientist visits place particular emphasis on working with the Student Chapter Committee in starting and supporting AAPG Student Chapters. AAPG Constitution and Bylaws

Constitution

As amended June 25, 2006.

ARTICLE I. NAME

This Association, which is incorporated under the laws of the State of Colorado, shall be called "The American Association of Petroleum Geologists."

ARTICLE II. PURPOSES

The purposes of this Association are to advance the science of geology, especially as it relates to petroleum, natural gas, other subsurface fluids, and mineral resources; to promote the technology of exploring for, finding, and producing these materials in an economically and environmentally sound manner; to foster the spirit of scientific research throughout its membership; to disseminate information relating to the geology and the associated technology of petroleum, natural gas, other subsurface fluids, and mineral resources; to inspire and maintain a high standard of professional conduct on the part of its members; to provide the public with means to recognize adequately trained and professionally responsible geologists; and to advance the professional well-being of its members.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1.

The members of this Association shall consist of persons concerned with the professional applications of the geological science.

SECTION 2.

Various classifications of memberships and the qualifications thereof shall be established by the Bylaws of the Association.

ARTICLE IV. CODE OF ETHICS

SECTION 1. General Principles

- (a) Geology is a profession, and the privilege of professional practice requires professional morality and professional responsibility.
- (b) Honesty, integrity, loyalty, fairness, impartiality, candor, fidelity to trust, and inviolability of confidence are incumbent upon every member as professional obligations.
- (c) Each member shall be guided by high standards of business ethics, personal honor, and professional conduct. The word "member" as used throughout this code includes all classes of membership.

SECTION 2. Relation of Members to the Public

- (a) Members shall not make false, misleading, or unwarranted statements, representations or claims in regard to professional matters, nor shall they engage in false or deceptive advertising
- (b) Members shall not permit the publication or use of their reports or maps for any unsound or illegitimate undertakings.

(c) Members shall not give professional opinions, make reports or give legal testimony without being as thoroughly informed as reasonably required.

SECTION 3. Relation of Members to Employers and Clients

- (a) Members shall disclose to prospective employers or clients the existence of any pertinent competitive or conflicting interests.
- (b) Members shall not use or divulge any employer's or client's confidential information without their permission and shall avoid conflicts of interest that may arise from information gained during geological investigations.

SECTION 4. Relation of Members to One Another

- (a) Members shall not falsely or maliciously attempt to injure the reputation or business of others.
- (b) Members shall freely recognize the work done by others, avoid plagiarism, and avoid the acceptance of credit due others.
- (c) Members shall endeavor to cooperate with others in the profession and shall encourage the ethical dissemination of geological knowledge.

SECTION 5. Duty to the Association

- (a) Members of the Association shall aid in preventing the election to membership of those who are unqualified or do not meet the standards set forth in this Code of Ethics.
- (b) By applying for or continuing membership in the Association each member agrees to uphold the ethical standards set forth in this Code of Ethics.
- (c) Members shall not use AAPG membership to imply endorsement, recommendation, or approval by the Association of specific projects or proposals.

SECTION 6. Discipline for Violations of Standards

Members violating any standard prescribed in this Article shall be subject to discipline as provided by the Bylaws.

ARTICLE V. GOVERNMENT

The government of this Association shall be vested in six (6) elected officers, an Executive Committee, a House of Delegates, and an Advisory Council. The composition of each body, the manner of selection, the terms of office, the specific duties, responsibilities, and other matters relevant to such bodies and officers shall be as provided in the Bylaws of this Association. Any responsibility and authority of government of this Association not otherwise specified in these governing documents shall be reserved to the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI. DISPOSITION OF ASSETS

The American Association of Petroleum Geologists is a non-profit organization. In the event of the dissolution of the Association, the Association shall distribute any assets remaining after the discharge of all liabilities, for charitable, scientific, or educational purposes in strict compliance with exemption provided under Section 501 (c)(6) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954. It is recognized that, under these circumstances, no member of the Association shall have any

right or interest in or to the property or assets of the Association.

ARTICLE VII. BYLAWS

The Bylaws, consisting of fourteen (14) articles as appended hereto, are hereby adopted and may be amended, enlarged, or reduced as provided in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE VIII. AMENDMENTS

SECTION 1. Mail, Electronic Mail or Other Suitable Ballot by Members

Amendments to this Constitution may be made by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the members of this Association responding by mail, electronic mail, or other suitable ballot.

SECTION 2. Proposal of Amendments

Such amendments may be proposed by the following:

- (a) Resolution by the Executive Committee;
- (b) Resolution by a special constitutional committee appointed by the President;
 - (c) Resolution of the House of Delegates;
- (d) A proposal in writing signed by any fifty (50) members of the Association.

All such resolutions or proposals must be submitted to, and action must be taken during, the annual meeting of the House of Delegates of this Association, as provided in the Bylaws and in conformance with Section 3 of this Article.

SECTION 3. Legality of Amendments

The legality of all amendments shall be determined by the Executive Committee with advice of counsel prior to consideration by the House of Delegates. In the event that a proposed amendment is revised by the House of Delegates, such revision will again be referred to the Executive Committee for determination of legality prior to balloting.

SECTION 4. Publication of Amendments

Upon affirmation of legality of the proposed amendments, the Executive Committee shall cause them to be published in the Bulletin or by other suitable means at least two (2) months prior to the annual meeting of the House of Delegates.

SECTION 5. Voting on Amendments

If any proposed amendment shall be acted upon favorably by simple majority vote of the House of Delegates, the Executive Committee shall arrange for a ballot of members by mail, electronic mail or other suitable means, within sixty (60) days after the annual meeting of the House of Delegates, and two-thirds (2/3) majority favorable vote of the ballots received within sixty (60) days of such mailing, electronic mail or other suitable distribution, shall be sufficient to amend.

Bylaws

As amended June 25, 2006.

ARTICLE I. MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. Membership

Membership in this Association shall consist of the following classifications:

- (a) Active Members
- (b) Emeritus Members
- (c) Honorary Members
- (d) Students
- (e) Associates

SECTION 2. Definition of Term "Member"

Unless otherwise expressly provided in these Bylaws, the term "member" shall refer only to Active, Emeritus, and Honorary Members. Only members may hold office, vote in Association affairs, sponsor membership applications, or refer to themselves as members of the Association.

SECTION 3. Active Members

Any person engaged in the practice or teaching of geology may apply for Active membership, provided the applicant holds a Bachelor's, Master's, or Doctor's Degree in geological science from a college of acceptable academic standards and, in addition, has had three (3) years of experience in the practice or teaching of geology. Credit for experience can be counted as follows: Master's Degree—one (1) year; Doctor's Degree—two (2) years. The Executive Committee may waive degree or current professional activity requirements if in its judgement an applicant has adequate professional experience and has attained standing in the profession.

SECTION 4. Emeritus Members

When Active Members in good standing in the Association, with all dues paid to date, become sixty-five (65) years of age and have been members of the Association (regardless of classification) for a total of thirty (30) years including time spent in military service, those members shall become Emeritus Members of this Association upon advising the Executive Director of the Association of their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, and by requesting such classification of membership. Thereafter the emeriti members shall pay fifty percent (50%) of the amount of dues for Active Members and shall be entitled to all privileges and advantages of Active membership in this Association.

SECTION 5. Honorary Members

Honorary Members shall be those Active Members of this Association who shall have contributed distinguished service to the cause of petroleum geology. Such determination shall be made by the Executive Committee. A recipient of the Sidney Powers Memorial Medal Award shall become automatically an Honorary Member. Honorary Members shall not be required to pay dues, but shall have all the privileges and advantages of Active membership in the Association.

SECTION 6. Students

Any student majoring in geology or in a field of study related to or generally associated with geology at a college of acceptable academic standards may apply for Student membership. Student membership shall terminate upon termination of academic enrollment.

SECTION 7. Associates

Any person not qualified for any other class of membership who is a graduate of a college of acceptable academic standards whose employment is associated with geology, may apply for election as an Associate. The Executive Committee may waive degree requirements, if in its judgement an applicant has adequate professional experience, and has attained professional standing.

SECTION 8. Election to Membership

Every candidate for admission as an Active Member shall submit a formal application on an application form authorized by the Executive Committee, signed by the applicant, and endorsed by not less than three (3) individuals, at least two (2) of whom are members who are in good standing, stating the applicant's training and experience and such other facts as the Executive Committee shall from time to time prescribe. The Executive Committee shall be the sole judge of the eligibility of the applicant for membership and the adequacy of the applicant's qualifications. If the Executive Committee after due consideration, judges that the applicant's qualifications meet the requirements of the Constitution and these Bylaws, the committee shall cause to be published in the Bulletin or by other suitable means, the applicant's name and the names of the sponsors. If, after sixty (60) days have elapsed since such publication, no reason is presented why the applicant should not be admitted, the applicant shall be deemed eligible to Active or Associate membership, as the case may be, and shall be notified of election to membership.

An objection to the admission to membership of an applicant must be submitted by an Active Member of the Association, must be in writing, must be received by the Executive Director at the Association's headquarters within sixty (60) days after publication of the applicant's name, must include a full statement of the circumstances on which the objection is based, and must be signed by the member raising the objection. If, in the opinion of the Executive Committee, the objection has merit, the Executive Committee shall reconsider the application.

SECTION 9. Resignation

Any member of whatever classification may resign at any time from the Association; such resignation shall be in writing and shall be accepted by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 10. Loss of Membership Rights

Any member of whatever classification who resigns, or who forfeits membership for non-payment of dues, or who is expelled for ethical reasons ceases to have any rights in the Association and ceases to incur further indebtedness to the Association.

SECTION 11. Reinstatement

Any person who has ceased to be a member of whatever classification who has resigned or who has forfeited membership for nonpayment of dues may be reinstated by unanimous vote of the Executive Committee upon fulfillment of such requirements as may be established by the Executive Committee. Any person who has been expelled from membership for ethical reasons may be reinstated as provided for in Article XI, Section 7 of these Bylaws.

ARTICLE II. OFFICERS, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, AND ASSOCIATION POSITIONS

SECTION 1. Designation

The officers of this Association shall be the following:

- (a) President
- (b) Vice President, Sections
- (c) Vice President, Regions
- (d) President-Elect
- (e) Secretary
- (f) Treasurer
- (g) Editor

SECTION 2. President

The President shall be the chief executive officer of this Association. The President shall be spokesman for the Association on all matters pertaining to the public; shall appoint the members of all committees within the limits prescribed in the Constitution and Bylaws; shall appoint delegates to cooperating organizations to represent the Association; and shall serve as chairman of the Executive Committee.

SECTION 3. Vice President, Sections

The Vice President, Sections, when elected earlier than the Vice President, Regions, shall perform the duties of the President in the absence or inability of the President to serve. The Vice President, Sections, when elected earlier than the Vice President, Regions, shall assume the office of President in case of a vacancy for any cause in that office; and shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the President. The Vice President, Sections shall, with his or her other duties, concern himself or herself with the activities of the Association in respect to United States Sections. A Vice President, Sections elected pursuant to the provisions of Section 12 of this Article II shall be presumed for the purposes of this Section 3 to have been elected on the date of his or her predecessor's election. The Vice President, Sections, while serving as such during the Association's fiscal year commencing July 1, 2007, shall be presumed to have been elected earlier than the Vice President, Regions.

SECTION 4. Vice President, Regions

The Vice President, Regions, when elected earlier than the Vice President, Sections, shall perform the duties of the President in the absence or inability of the President to serve. The Vice President, Regions, when elected earlier than the Vice President, Sections, shall assume the office of President in case of a vacancy for any cause in that office; and shall perform such duties as may be assigned by the President. The Vice President, Regions shall, with his or her other duties, concern himself or herself with the activities of the Association in respect to International Regions. A Vice President, Regions elected pursuant to the provisions of Section 12 of this Article II shall be presumed for the purposes of this Section 4 to have been elected on the date of his or her predecessor's election.

SECTION 5. President-Elect

The President-Elect shall serve for one (1) year as such and in the following year shall assume the office of President. The President-Elect shall have no administrative authority except as a member of the Executive Committee; shall become acquainted with all the details of the office of President, and generally become prepared to serve as President. The President-Elect shall be responsible for the preparation of

the budget for the ensuing fiscal year for approval by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 6. Secretary

The Secretary shall be responsible for recording the actions of the Executive Committee; shall keep possession of the corporate seal and affix the same; and, subject to Executive Committee approval, shall have policy oversight of all non-technical and non-peer reviewed publications and communications. The Secretary shall perform other duties as may be directed by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 7. Treasurer

The Treasurer shall supervise the receipt of all funds and, under the direction of the Executive Committee, be responsible for all disbursements of funds of the Association; shall serve ex officio as a member of the Committee on Investments; shall give bond, the amount of which shall be determined by the Executive Committee, shall make the annual report as Treasurer, and perform such other duties as directed by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 8. Editor

The Editor shall have general supervision and final authority in soliciting, accepting, and rejecting all material on technical subjects for publication. The Editor shall have policy oversight and responsibility for editorial content of all technical and peer reviewed publications. With the approval of the Executive Committee, the Editor shall appoint, replace, and reappoint such volunteer associate editors from among the membership of the Association that may be required to accomplish the publication activities of the Association. The Editor shall submit an annual report of editorial activities to the Executive Committee.

SECTION 9. Executive Director

Executive Committee policies shall be implemented by the Executive Director who shall have charge of the Association headquarters and staff personnel as authorized by the Executive Committee. The Executive Director shall be the person to whom all official notices to the Association will be addressed; shall be responsible for the physical custody of all official documents held in repository at Association headquarters; shall be under the personal direction of the President; and will assist in the work of all committees to ensure the effectiveness of the activities of this Association. The Executive Director shall be appointed by and serve at the pleasure of the Executive Committee. The Executive Director shall be chief administrative official of the Association, shall have the authority to execute contracts on behalf of the Association, shall not be an officer of the Association, and shall not be a member of the Executive Committee.

SECTION 10. Terms of Office

- (a) The President and President-Elect, each as such, shall serve a one (1)-year term and shall not succeed themselves in office. The Vice President, Sections and the Vice President, Regions, each as such, shall serve a two (2)-year staggered term and shall not succeed themselves in office. Secretary and Treasurer, each as such, shall serve a two (2)-year staggered term and shall not succeed themselves in office. The Editor, as such, shall serve a three (3)-year term and shall not serve successive terms as Editor. Notwithstanding the above, the term of the Vice President, Sections which commences July 1, 2007, shall be for one year.
- (b) The terms of office shall commence on July 1 following election.

SECTION 11. Election of Officers

- (a) These officers shall be elected from among the members of the Association by means of secret ballot in the following manner: not later than June 30 of each year the Advisory Council shall annually recommend two (2) or more candidates each for the office of President-Elect, biennially recommend two (2) or more candidates each for offices of Vice President, Sections; Vice President, Regions; Secretary; and Treasurer; and triennially recommend two (2) or more candidates for the office of Editor to stand for election during the following fiscal year, and, if elected, to serve during the second succeeding fiscal year. The Executive Committee shall approve the candidates recommended in the order (if the Advisory Council recommends candidates in a particular order) and for the office recommended by the Advisory Council unless the Executive Committee, by the affirmative vote of not less than five of its members in each instance, alters the order in which candidates are recommended or changes the office for which a particular candidate is recommended; provided, however, that no person shall be a candidate who declines such candidacy. The Executive Committee shall annually approve two (2) candidates each for the office of President-Elect, biennially approve two (2) candidates each for the offices of Vice President, Sections; Vice President, Regions; Secretary; and Treasurer; and triennially approve two (2) candidates for the office of Editor. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, the Advisory Council shall recommend two (2) or more candidates and the Executive Committee shall approve two (2) candidates for each of the offices of Vice President, Sections and Vice President, Regions for the elections to be conducted in the Association's fiscal year commencing July 1, 2006. Additional nominations may be made by written petition of fifty (50) or more members in good standing received at Association headquarters not later than October 15 following. A candidate or nominee for the office of Vice President, Sections must reside within the United States and be a member of a Section at the date of his or her approval by the Executive Committee as a candidate for such office as described in this Section 11 or when otherwise initially becoming a candidate or nominee for such office. A candidate or nominee for the office of Vice President, Regions must reside outside of the United States and be a member of a Region at the date of his or her approval by the Executive Committee as a candidate for such office as described in this Section 11 or when otherwise initially becoming a candidate or nominee for such office. The names of candidates shall be published in the Explorer or by other suitable means ninety (90) days prior to distribution of ballots to members. The Executive Committee shall then prepare a printed, electronic, or other suitable ballot, listing the candidates for each office, and one (1) ballot shall be mailed, electronically distributed, or distributed by other suitable means to each member on or before April 1. Such ballots may consist of any combination of printed, electronic, and other suitable ballots. Marked ballots returned to and received by the Association after May 15 shall not be counted. The ballot committee shall count the ballots promptly after May 15 and report the results to the President. A majority of all votes cast for an office is necessary for election. In case of a tie vote the Executive Committee shall cast one (1) additional deciding vote.
- (b) In the event that there are more than two (2) candidates for any office, whether through petition or other means as provided for in these Bylaws, then the candidate elected to that office shall be determined as provided in this subsection

(b). The ballots for offices having more than two (2) candidates shall provide for the candidates to be voted upon by the voters in order of preference; i.e., first choice, second choice, etc. The candidate receiving a majority of the first choice votes shall be elected to that office. If no candidate receives a majority of the first choice votes cast, then the candidate that received the least number of first choice votes shall be dropped from consideration, and the second choices of those voters whose first choice was the dropped candidate shall be deemed those voters' first choice. Upon a tabulation of the votes according to the provisions of the previous sentence, a candidate with a majority of first choice votes shall be elected; if no candidate yet has a majority, the candidate remaining with the least number of first choice votes shall be dropped from consideration, and the process described above shall again be applied in another tabulation of the votes to determine if a candidate has received a majority of the first choice votes. The process provided in this subsection (b) shall be re-applied until a candidate receives a majority of the first choice votes cast. In the process described in this subsection (b) the first choice of any voter in any tabulation shall be deemed to be the candidate chosen highest by that voter after removing from that voter's selections the candidate or candidates who have been dropped from consideration prior to the pertinent tabulation.

SECTION 12. Vacancies

- (a) A vacancy occurring in the office of Secretary, Treasurer, or Editor shall be filled by the unsuccessful candidate for that office in the most recent election. If there were more than one unsuccessful candidate for that office in said election, the candidate to fill the vacancy will be selected in accordance with the election process in Article II, Section 11 subsection (b), of these Bylaws. Should the unsuccessful candidate or candidates be unwilling or unable to fill such vacancy, the Executive Committee shall fill such vacancy.
- (b) A vacancy occurring in the office of President-Elect, Vice President, Section, or Vice President, Regions shall be filled by mail, electronic mail, or other suitable ballot by membership, through a special election called by the Executive Committee. Any such ballot may consist of any combination of mail, electronic mail, and other suitable means.

SECTION 13. Release of Election Results

If all candidates in any AAPG election for a specific office approve in writing a statement authorizing the release of the numerical results of their election, those results shall be released to each of the said candidates. Any of those candidates may subsequently disclose such election results to any person provided all candidates agree in writing. For the purposes of this Section 12, AAPG elections include, but are not limited to, elections for officers of the Association, the House of Delegates, and the Divisions, and any other election between members of any classification conducted by the Association.

SECTION 14. Limitations on Association Positions

(a) No member of any classification may hold more than one of the following offices at any one time;

Association President;

Association Vice President, Sections;

Association Vice President, Regions;

Association President-Elect;

Association Secretary;

Association Treasurer;

Association Editor;

Chairman, House of Delegates;

Chairman-Elect, House of Delegates;

Secretary-Editor, House of Delegates;

Immediate Past Chairman, House of Delegates

President of any Division;

Advisory Council member elected by any United States Section; and

Advisory Council member elected by any International Region.

(b) No past president of the Association may within three (3) years after expiration of his or her term of office as such hold any of the offices listed in subsection 14(a) above.

SECTION 15. Limitations on Nomination and Honors and Awards

- (a) Members serving as any of the officers described in Article II of these Bylaws, as officers of the House of Delegates, or on the Advisory Council shall not be eligible to be nominated for any of the offices described in Article II of these Bylaws or selected for an honor or award by the body on or in which they serve, except for the House of Delegates' Recognition of Service Award.
- (b) Candidates for the offices described in Article II of these Bylaws, for officers of the House of Delegates, for members of the AAPG Advisory Council representing United States Sections or International Regions, or for president of any Technical Division may not be selected to receive any honor or award by any of those bodies during the period of their candidacy, unless the honor or award has been announced prior to the announcement of their candidacy.
- (c) Members serving as any of the officers described in Section 1 of Article II of these Bylaws, as the Chairman of the House of Delegates, or on the Advisory Council shall not be eligible to be a candidate for any of the offices described in Section 1, Article II, of these Bylaws in any election during such service or in the Association's fiscal year immediately following the end of such service.

ARTICLE III. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. Executive Authority

The executive authority of this Association shall be vested in an Executive Committee which shall serve as its Board of Directors and which shall be composed of the following members:

- (a) President
- (b) Vice President, Sections
- (c) Vice President, Regions
- (d) President-Elect
- (e) Secretary
- (f) Treasurer
- (g) Editor
- (h) Chairman, House of Delegates

SECTION 2. Jurisdiction

(a) The Executive Committee shall have general executive control and management of the affairs and funds of this Association; these shall include, but not be limited to: designation of time and place of the annual meeting of the Association; supervision of election of officers and filling vacancies; determination of applicant qualifications and classifications; maintaining a headquarters and staff; accepting, creating, and administering funds for purposes provided under the Constitution and Bylaws of this Association;

appointing trustees to manage such funds; establishing such fiscal policies as may be appropriate; and performing such other administrative duties as required to accomplish the objects and purposes of this Association.

(b) The Executive Committee shall also serve as an appeal authority in all matters involving grievance proceedings and professional certification of members.

(c) The Executive Committee shall have sole responsibility and authority for all matters involving the external affairs of this Association.

SECTION 3. Meetings

- (a) The Executive Committee shall meet immediately before the annual meeting of the House of Delegates and at such other times during the year and at such places as designated by such Executive Committee and at the call of the President. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply at all meetings, except as the same may be inconsistent with any procedure authorized by this Section 3. A quorum shall consist of four (4) members. No proxy votes shall be allowed and no alternates may be appointed for absent members.
- (b) A member of the Executive Committee may participate in a regular or special meeting by, or the meeting may be conducted through the use of, any means of communication allowed under the Colorado Revised Nonprofit Corporations Act.
- (c) Any action required or permitted to be taken at a meeting of the Executive Committee may be taken without a meeting to the full extent allowed by the Colorado Revised Nonprofit Corporations Act.
- (d) Five (5) days notice of regular or special meetings of the Executive Committee shall be given, which shall include the date, time, place, and, if a special meeting, purpose of the meeting. Notice may be given in any manner permitted by the Colorado Revised Nonprofit Corporations Act, and shall be effective as provided by such Act. Members of the Executive Committee may waive notice as provided under the Colorado Revised Nonprofit Corporations Act.

SECTION 4. Indemnification and Relief from Liability

The officers and directors of the Association, being the Executive Committee, shall be indemnified by the Association and shall be relieved from personal liability in all matters regarding the Association to the full extent authorized by the laws of the State of Colorado.

SECTION 5. Amendment of Certificate of Incorporation

The Executive Committee shall have the authority, by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote, to amend the Certificate of Incorporation of the Association.

ARTICLE IV. HOUSE OF DELEGATES

SECTION 1. Jurisdiction

- (a) All of the legislative function of this Association, within the scope of the Constitution and Bylaws, shall be vested in a House of Delegates.
- (b) All matters involving the external affairs of the Association shall be referred to the Executive Committee of the Association.

SECTION 2. Apportionment of United States Affiliated Society Delegates and International Region Delegates

Each United States Affiliated Society shall be entitled to one (1) Delegate for up to seventy (70) members of the

Association and to one (1) additional Delegate for each additional seventy (70) members, or major fraction thereof, allocated to that society for voting purposes. Each International Region shall be entitled to one (1) Delegate for up to seventy (70) members of the Association and to one (1) additional Delegate for each additional seventy (70) members, or major fraction thereof, allocated to that Region for voting purposes; provided, however, that no International Region shall have fewer Delegates than one (1) Delegate for each Affiliated Society within the Region.

SECTION 3. Selection of United States Affiliated Society Delegates and International Region Delegates

Delegates shall be selected by popular vote of American Association of Petroleum Geologists members in elections conducted annually by United States Affiliated Societies and International Regions. Voting shall be restricted to those Association members claiming the Affiliated Society or Region as their home society or region. Association members residing in the United States and not members of any United States Affiliated Society may be assigned for the purpose of voting in elections for Delegates to the nearest United States Affiliated Society upon request to that society, without enjoying any of the membership privileges. All Association members residing outside of the United States shall be assigned to the International Regions in which they reside and shall vote in that Region in elections for Delegates unless claiming a United States Affiliated Society or another Region as their home society or region. All members of an International Region shall be entitled to vote in all elections for all Delegates from that Region. Each International Region shall elect, in an election or elections in which all members of such region shall be entitled to vote, not less than one (1) Delegate from among the Association members of each Affiliated Society within that International Region. Additional Delegates, if any, to which a Region may be entitled shall be elected as determined by the Region; provided, that all Association members assigned to an International Region shall be entitled to vote in all elections of Delegates from that International Region. Any Association member may be a candidate for Delegate from the United States Affiliated Society or International Region in which the member votes upon the member's timely written request. Delegates shall be elected for three (3)-year terms and may succeed themselves; provided, however, that any Delegate elected as an officer of the House of Delegates during the third year of the Delegate's three-year term shall automatically be a voting At-Large Member of the House of Delegates for the one year such person serves as such officer. Terms of office shall begin on July 1 following their election. Vacancies in office, or alternates for Delegates unable to attend meetings of the House of Delegates may be filled or obtained from among the candidates not receiving a sufficient number of votes for election, and in order of the total number of votes received. In the event alternates for Delegates are not available from the candidates described above, then the members of a United States Affiliated Society or an International Region who are Association members may appoint alternate Delegates for said meeting. The names of these appointed alternate Delegates must be received in writing by the Headquarters office of the Association at least fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting of the House of Delegates for which they are appointed.

SECTION 4. At-Large Members

- (a) Each current member of the Executive Committee of the Association, each past-chairman of the House of Delegates, and each past-president of the Association more than three (3) years out of office, shall be a non-voting member of the House of Delegates. Any At-Large Member may also serve as a voting member if selected by the procedure provided in Article IV, Section 3 above.
- (b) An officer of the House of Delegates shall be a voting At-Large Member of the House of Delegates if such officer is not otherwise a voting Delegate.

SECTION 5. Duties of United States Affiliated Society Delegates and International Region Delegates

- (a) Delegates shall serve as representatives of the Association members of their United States Affiliated Society or International Region.
- (b) Delegates shall familiarize themselves with the Association's Constitution and Bylaws.
- (c) Delegates shall acquaint themselves with the Association's current policies and programs.
- (d) Delegates shall inform the leaders of their society or region regarding the Association's program of activities, especially as it relates to cooperative participation and service, and shall keep alternates fully apprised of such matters.
- (e) Delegates shall process requests from the Executive Committee for information regarding eligibility of applicants for membership in the Association.
- (f) Delegates shall function as local Certification committeemen and process requests from the Board of Certification for information regarding applicants for Certification by the Association.
- (g) Delegates shall actively solicit applications from eligible geologists for membership in this Association.
- (h) Members of the Association before becoming candidates for the office of Delegate should recognize the obligation to attend all meetings of the House of Delegates during their term, and to perform to the best of their ability all duties imposed upon them by these Bylaws.

SECTION 6. Meetings of House of Delegates

The House of Delegates shall meet at least once each year during the annual meeting of the Association. Voting shall be only by those Delegates, or their duly qualified alternates, present and accounted for. No proxy votes shall be allowed. A quorum shall be a majority of all qualified Delegates or alternates elected. The Rules and Procedures established by the House shall be followed and, where not otherwise provided in such Rules and Procedures, Robert's Rules of Order shall apply in all meetings.

SECTION 7. Accreditation of Delegates

- (a) All members of the House of Delegates shall be members in good standing of this Association.
- (b) The House of Delegates shall be the sole judge of the qualifications of its members within the provisions of this Article.

SECTION 8. Officers of House of Delegates

(a) The officers of the House of Delegates shall be a Chairman, a Chairman-Elect and a Secretary/Editor. The House of Delegates shall elect the Chairman-Elect and the Secretary/Editor at its annual meeting. The term of office shall be one year commencing July 1 following election of officers. The Chairman-Elect shall assume the office of Chairman of

the House of Delegates the year following his or her term of office as Chairman-Elect.

- (b) Only those members of the House of Delegates having served at least one (1) year as such Delegate shall be eligible to hold any of the offices mentioned in subsection (a) above. Only Delegates may be candidates for any of the offices mentioned in subsection (a) above.
- (c) The Chairman of the House of Delegates shall become ex officio a member of the Executive Committee of the Association with full voting privileges, and may not serve succeeding terms.
- (d) A vacancy occurring in the office of Chairman shall be filled by the Chairman-Elect who shall, in the event such vacancy occurs prior to the annual meeting of the House of Delegates during such Chairman-Elect's term of office remain as Chairman during the succeeding year. A vacancy occurring in the office of Chairman-Elect shall be filled by the Secretary/Editor. A vacancy occurring in the office of Secretary/Editor shall be filled by appointment by the Chairman.

ARTICLE V. ADVISORY COUNCIL

SECTION 1. Jurisdiction

The advisory function of this Association shall be vested in an Advisory Council. The Council shall have no executive authority, but shall report to the Executive Committee on all matters involving ethics and discipline referred to it. The Council shall conduct long-range planning and undertake the necessary studies and investigations in connection therewith. It shall report to the Executive Committee on all matters involving constitutional review referred to it. The Council shall recommend to the Executive Committee nominations for Association officers and also honors and awards, with the exception of the Matson Award and the Jules Braunstein Memorial Award. The Council shall review the organization of the Association and the standing committee structure of the Association. It shall also undertake any special projects wherein guidance is requested by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 2. Ethics and Discipline

Five members of the Advisory Council shall serve as the Hearing Body in grievance proceedings as provided in Article XI of these Bylaws, except as otherwise provided in Article XI, Section 8, of these Bylaws.

SECTION 3. Long-Range Planning

The Advisory Council shall serve as a functioning long-range planning body to review the Association's activities and recommend to the Executive Committee appropriate changes of programs and policies.

SECTION 4. Constitution Review

The Advisory Council shall constantly review the Constitution and Bylaws and recommend to the Executive Committee appropriate amendments to meet the changing needs of this Association.

SECTION 5. Nominations

The Advisory Council shall recommend candidates for Association officers as provided in these Bylaws.

SECTION 6. Honors and Awards

The Advisory Council shall recommend recipients for all honors and awards which may be established by the Executive Committee with the exception of the Matson Award and the Jules Braunstein Memorial Award.

SECTION 7. Additional Duties

The Advisory Council shall be charged with reviewing relationships among the Association, Sections, and Divisions, and other organizations in order to recommend adjustments which will benefit the Association and its members.

The Advisory Council shall engage in such other special projects and shall perform such duties as the Executive Committee may, from time to time, direct.

SECTION 8. Composition and Terms of Office

Except as set forth in subparagraph (a) and (c) below, the members of the Advisory Council shall each serve for three (3)-year terms in rotation. The members of the Advisory Council shall consist of the following:

- (a) The immediate past-president and the two (2) former presidents who have served most recently or their designated representatives from their respective Executive Committees and the immediate past chairman of the House of Delegates;
- (b) One (1) or more members of the Association elected every third year by the Association members of each United States Section and International Region, in accordance with a schedule established by the Executive Committee to provide staggered terms and subject to the provisions of subparagraph (d) of this Section 8;
- (c) The chief elected officer of each Division who shall serve ex officio during the officer's term, provided said Division has not less than seven hundred and fifty (750) Association members on the first day of the fiscal year of the Association. The chief elected officer of each Division with less than seven hundred and fifty (750) Association members shall be entitled to attend Advisory Council meetings as an Observer but will not be a member of the Advisory Council.
- (d) Each United States Section and International Region with not less than seven hundred and fifty (750) Association members shall be entitled to elect one Advisory Council member for up to five thousand (5,000) Association members within such section or region. Each United States Section and International Region with less than seven hundred and fifty (750) Association members will elect for a three (3)-year term an Observer to attend Advisory Council meetings but who will not be a member of the Advisory Council except as otherwise provided in these Bylaws. If a Section or a Region which elected an Observer has seven hundred and fifty (750) or more Association members on the first day of any fiscal year of the Association, such Observer shall become a member of the Advisory Council as of that date and continue as such for the remainder of the Observer's three (3)-year term. A Section or Region shall be entitled to elect an additional Advisory Council member for each additional five thousand (5,000) members, or any fraction thereof. For the purposes of this subparagraph (d), the number of members of a section or region shall be determined as of the first day of the Association's fiscal year in which an election is to occur. Once elected, an Advisory Council member from a Section or Region shall serve for three (3) years, regardless of the number of members in such section or region during the term of that Advisory Council member.

SECTION 9. Meetings

The Advisory Council shall meet at least once each year during the annual meeting of the Association, and shall submit annual reports to the Executive Committee. Additional meetings may be held at the call of the Chairman. A quorum

shall consist of a simple majority of members. Robert's Rules of Order shall apply at all meetings. No proxies shall be allowed, but alternates for absentee members may be appointed in accordance with Section 8, paragraph (a), or the procedures prescribed in Section 12 of this Article V. Mail canvasses may be conducted when necessary for interim action requested by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 10. Presiding Officer

The immediate past-president of this Association shall serve as Chairman of the Advisory Council, unless, in the event the immediate past-president cannot serve, another member of the Council is elected by the Councillors, to serve. The Chairman shall appoint a Recording Secretary who shall keep minutes of each meeting.

SECTION 11. Observers at Advisory Council Meetings

The Advisory Council will invite the following Observers to attend its meetings:

- (a) The Executive Director;
- (b) The President;
- (c) The Chairman of the House of Delegates;
- (d) The chief elected officer of each Technical Division that has less than seven hundred and fifty (750) Association members, provided, that the Technical Division would otherwise qualify to elect a member of the Advisory Council were its membership not less than seven hundred and fifty (750) Association members; and
- (e) The elected representative from any United States Section or International Region that has less than seven hundred and fifty (750) Association members, provided, that the United States Section or International Region would otherwise qualify to elect a member of the Advisory Council were its membership not less than seven hundred and fifty (750) Association members. Observers are not Advisory Council members, may not vote, and will not attend executive sessions of the Advisory Council unless authorized to do so by a vote of the Advisory Council.

SECTION 12. Alternates at Advisory Council Meetings for Absent Members

The alternate representative for an absent Advisory Council member shall be that absent member's immediate predecessor as a member of the Advisory Council, except as prescribed in Section 8, paragraph (a) of this Article. If the absent Advisory Council member represents a Region, Section, or Division and did not have a predecessor, or if that predecessor is unwilling or unable to attend in place of the absent Advisory Council member, then the alternate representative shall be designated by the Region, Section, or Division President, and shall be a current member of its executive committee. If an Advisory Council member dies or resigns, then prior to the election of a successor member as prescribed in Article VI, Section 1, such former member's alternate representative shall be as otherwise provided herein for an absent member. An alternate representative may be seated at any time during an Advisory Council meeting. The alternate representative shall have the authority, including the right to vote, of the absent member.

ARTICLE VI. UNITED STATES SECTIONS, INTERNATIONAL REGIONS AND TECHNICAL DIVISIONS

SECTION 1. United States Sections and International Regions

This Association shall establish United States Sections within the United States and International Regions outside the United States on a geographical basis to include Association members as individuals or as groups of federated affiliated geological societies, for the purpose of sponsoring technical meetings and publications and otherwise furthering the objectives of the Association within such Sections or Regions.

United States Sections shall be the:

- (a) Eastern Section;
- (b) Mid-Continent Section;
- (c) Southwestern Section;
- (d) Gulf Coast Section;
- (e) Rocky Mountain Section; and
- (f) Pacific Section;

International Regions shall be the:

- (a) Canadian Region;
- (b) Mexican, Central American, and South American Region;
- (c) European Region;
- (d) African Region;
- (e) Asian/Pacific Region; and
- (f) Middle Eastern Region.

The composition of each Section and Region may be revised, individual Sections and Regions may be dissolved, and additional Sections and Regions may be established upon application of interested individuals and upon the recommendation of the Executive Committee by vote at the annual meeting of the House of Delegates. The internal affairs of such Sections and Regions shall be administered by each Section and Region consistent with the purposes and policies of this Association.

Each Section and Region shall be entitled to elect, subject to the provisions of Article V, Section 8, subparagraph (d), of these Bylaws, from among Association members in such Section or Region, a Councillor or Councillors to serve for three (3)-year terms as elected members of the Advisory Council. Each United States Section and International Region with less than seven hundred and fifty (750) Association members shall be entitled to elect an Observer as provided in Article V, Section 8, subparagraph (d), of these Bylaws. Each such Councillor and Observer shall be elected by ballot, submitted to all Association members of the respective Section or Region, from among not less than two candidates nominated by the Section or Region governing body or by submission of a petition of nomination signed by not less than fifty (50) members of such Section or Region and delivered to the Section or Region president at least 30 days prior to start of said election. Vacancies in Councillor or Observer positions shall be filled by election to be held within 120 days of said-vacancy.

SECTION 2. Technical Divisions

Technical Divisions may be established, provided that the members interested perfect an organization and make application to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall submit the application with its recommendations to a vote at an annual meeting of the House of Delegates, an affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the Delegates present and voting being necessary for the establishment of such a Division. In like manner, the Association may dissolve a Division by an affirmative vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the Delegates present and voting at an annual meeting of the House of Delegates. A Technical Division may have its own officers, and it may have its own Constitution and Bylaws provided that, in the opinion of the Executive Committee, these do not conflict with the Constitution and Bylaws of the Association. The Executive Committee shall be empowered to make arrangements with the officers of the Division for the conduct of the

business of the Division. Technical Divisions may affiliate with other scientific societies, with the approval of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VII. AFFILIATED SOCIETIES AND ASSOCIATED SOCIETIES

SECTION 1. Affiliated Societies

This Association may affiliate with duly organized groups or societies which serve the needs of members of the Association in geographically defined areas and which by objects, aims, constitutions, bylaws, or practice are functioning in harmony with the objects and aims of the Association, subject, however, to the recommendations of the Executive Committee and to the affirmative vote of the House of Delegates. Affiliated Societies within the United States (referred to in these Bylaws as "United States Affiliated Societies") and International Regions shall be eligible to elect Delegates to the House of Delegates of the Association.

SECTION 2. Associated Societies

This Association may associate with duly organized groups or societies which serve the needs of members of the Association in topically and/or geographically defined areas and which by objects, aims, constitutions, bylaws, or practice are functioning in harmony with the objects and aims of the Association, subject, however, to the recommendations of the Executive Committee and to the affirmative vote of the House of Delegates. Associated Societies shall not be eligible to elect Delegates to the House of Delegates of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII. COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. Standing Committees

Except as provided in Article XI of these Bylaws, the Executive Committee of this Association, acting on Advisory Council recommendations, shall have the authority to establish, maintain, and dissolve standing committees of the Association. In like manner, the charge to each standing committee may be modified. A list of standing committees, the charge to each committee, and the names of the chairmen, vice-chairmen, and committee members shall be published annually. The Executive Committee shall report to the House of Delegates at its annual meeting as to the establishment or dissolution of any standing committees since the last meeting of the House of Delegates.

SECTION 2. Appointments and Tenure

Except as provided in Article XI of these Bylaws, the President shall appoint all committee chairmen, vice chairmen and other committee members and fill vacancies whenever they occur, except where otherwise specified in these Bylaws. The Executive Committee shall determine the number of members of each standing committee. The Executive Committee may remove any committee chairman, vice chairman, or other member with or without cause. The term of office of a member of a standing committee, unless otherwise provided in these Bylaws, shall be three (3) years beginning July 1. Appointments of chairmen and vice-chairmen shall be for one (1) year beginning July 1. Members of standing committees (other than chairmen and vice chairmen) shall serve in rotating terms. One-third (1/3) of the members of

each standing committee (other than the chairman and vice chairman), unless otherwise provided, shall be appointed each year. No chairman of a standing committee may serve as such for more than three consecutive years. Each chairman and vice chairman of a committee shall be a member of such committee by virtue of his or her office. Committee members shall be Association members of any classification.

SECTION 3. Special Committees and Delegations

In addition to the standing committees, the President may appoint, annually, such special committees and delegations as the Executive Committee may authorize. Members of special committees shall be appointed for a term of one (1) year only and the President shall designate the chairmen.

ARTICLE IX. FOUNDATION

This Association shall establish an autonomous Foundation as a permanent entity to receive contributions, invest same, and distribute funds for the purposes and provisions as stipulated in Article II of the Declaration of Trust Agreement dated April 4, 1967; provided, that the Foundation need not retain the trust form of organization. The Executive Committee of the Association shall represent the Association's dealings with the Foundation.

ARTICLE X. CERTIFICATION

This Association may establish a technical division to conduct a program of voluntary certification of members in such professional categories as approved from time to time by the Executive Committee of the Association. Each professional category of certification will be sponsored by a technical division which need not be the technical division conducting the certification program. Upon certification a member would be designated as certified in the pertinent professional category by such title as approved by the Executive Committee of the Association. Implementing procedures, including the issuance of appropriate certificates, shall be adopted by the technical division conducting the certification program.

ARTICLE XI. GRIEVANCE PROCEEDINGS

SECTION 1. Adoption and Publication of Implementing Procedures

The Executive Committee shall, in accordance with and subject to the provisions of these Bylaws, adopt procedures governing the investigation, hearing, and disposition of charges of misconduct in violation of Article IV of the Constitution, in accordance with the provisions of this Article XI, and shall publish such procedures in the Bulletin or by other suitable means.

SECTION 2. Investigation Procedure

Charges of misconduct in violation of Article IV of the Constitution shall first be submitted in writing to the Executive Director at Association headquarters with a statement of the evidence on which the charges are based. The Executive Director shall submit the charges to the Ethics Committee of the Association which shall be a standing committee and which shall consist of five (5) members of the technical

division of the Association charged with conducting the program or programs of certification of members in professional categories and who shall be appointed by the Executive Committee of the Association for staggered three (3) year terms as members of the Ethics Committee. The provisions of Article VIII of these Bylaws shall not apply to the Ethics Committee. The Ethics Committee shall be charged with the investigation and prosecution of such charges, and may conduct such investigation as the Ethics Committee deems necessary to reasonably and thoroughly investigate the charges. If in the judgment of the Ethics Committee and after consultation with AAPG legal counsel, the evidence supports further action by the Association on the charges, the committee shall prepare and file with the Advisory Council at Association headquarters formal charges against the accused member. Upon such filing the Chairman of the Advisory Council shall appoint a Hearing Body from the Advisory Council members, in accordance with Section 3 of this Article XI, and the Ethics Committee shall appoint one of its members as the prosecutor. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in these Bylaws and except for proceedings pursuant to the provisions of Section 8 of this Article, disposition of the charges on any terms or conditions agreed to by all of the Ethics Committee, the Chairman of the Advisory Council, and the accused member, and approved by the Executive Committee of the Association (regardless of whether such terms or conditions are listed in phrases (a), (b), (c), or (d) of Section 4 of this Article XI) may be made at any time prior to the conclusion of the proceedings provided for in this Article XI and upon such disposition all proceedings under this Article XI concerning the charges of misconduct against the accused member shall cease. The existence of allegations against any member, and the basis and content thereof, is confidential.

SECTION 3. Hearing Procedure

The Hearing Body shall consist of five (5) members of the Advisory Council, including at least one (1) past president of the Association, all of whom shall be appointed by the Chairman of the Advisory Council. Each of the prosecutor and the accused member may challenge and have removed not more than two (2) members of the Hearing Body and such removed members shall be replaced with other members of the Advisory Council selected by the Chairman of the Advisory Council. The Hearing Body shall set the time, date, and place for a hearing on the charges and the accused member shall be given notice in writing of the time, date, and place of the hearing, mailed to the member by registered mail to the member's last-known mailing address not less than thirty (30) days prior to such date, accompanied by a copy of the formal charges and a copy of this Article. The accused member may appear with legal counsel before the Hearing Body, hear any witnesses called in support of the charges and, at the member's option, cross-examine the same, present witnesses in the member's behalf, and submit oral or written statements in the member's behalf. The prosecutor may likewise be represented by legal counsel, present witnesses, and cross-examine the accused member's witnesses. The Hearing Body may consult at any time with legal counsel of its choosing at all stages of the proceedings in which it is involved. At the accused member's option, the accused member may, by registered letter addressed to the Chairman of the Advisory Council at Association headquarters, postmarked not less than ten (10) days prior to the date of the hearing, waive personal appearance and request the Hearing Body to adjudge the matter on the basis of a

written statement of the member's defense accompanying such letter.

SECTION 4. Decision of Hearing Body

After the conclusion of the hearing or study of the written defense submitted in lieu thereof, the Hearing Body shall consider and vote to sustain or dismiss the charges. If, by not less than a four-fifths (4/5) vote of all of the members of the Hearing Body, the Hearing Body shall declare sustained the charges against the accused member, then the Hearing Body may impose the following discipline:

- (a) issue a private or public admonition of the member; or
- (b) suspend the member for a stated period of time; or
- (c) allow the member to resign; or
- (d) expel the member.

Failure of the accused member to appear, or to submit a waiver letter and a written defense, as provided in this section, shall not prevent the Hearing Body from rendering final judgement. Notice of the decision of the Hearing Body shall be sent by registered mail to the accused member at the member's last-known post office mailing address.

SECTION 5. Appeals Procedure

Action taken by the Hearing Body may be appealed to the Executive Committee of the Association by either the accused member or the Ethics Committee within thirty (30) days of the date notice of the decision of the Hearing Body is sent to the accused member. The Executive Committee shall have final authority whether to sustain or order a rehearing on the decision of the Hearing Body.

SECTION 6. Resignation

Resignation by the accused member from the Association, at any stage in the foregoing prescribed proceedings, shall automatically terminate the proceedings. Following resignation, the accused person so resigning shall not be eligible for reinstatement to membership unless by unanimous vote of all members of the Executive Committee of the Association.

SECTION 7. Expulsion

Persons expelled from the Association under these proceedings shall thenceforth be ineligible for reinstatement to membership unless by unanimous vote of all members of the Executive Committee of the Association.

SECTION 8. Alternative Procedure

Any member (a) who pleads guilty to a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude or to any felony, (b) who admits to the violation of any governmental statute, regulation, rule, or code of ethics relating to the practice of geology, or (c) who the Executive Committee determines falsely stated qualifications for membersip in an application for Association membership may be expelled from membership in the Association upon a majority vote of all members of the Executive Committee of the Association.

Any member who does not plead guilty to but is convicted of a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude or of any felony or who is found by a governmental body to have violated any governmental statute, regulation, rule, or code of ethics relating to the practice of geology may be suspended from membership in the Association upon a majority vote of all members of the Executive Committee of the Association. If such a conviction or finding is reversed on appeal, the member shall be reinstated to membership. If such a

conviction or finding is not appealed or is upheld on final appeal, the member may be expelled from membership in the Association upon a majority vote of all members of the Executive Committee of the Association. If such a conviction or finding is the subject of an executive pardon, the member shall be reinstated to membership upon a majority vote of all members of the Executive Committee of the Association.

In the event that (a) expulsion of a member so pleading guilty or so admitting violation is proposed, (b) expulsion of a member for so falsely stating qualifications is proposed, or (c) suspension or expulsion of a member so convicted or so found is proposed, a date shall be set for a hearing thereon and for consideration by the Executive Committee of such proposed suspension or expulsion. The member shall be given notice in writing of the date and place for the hearing, mailed to the member by registered mail to the member's last-known mailing address not less than thirty (30) days before said date, accompanied by, as applicable, a copy of a court document or other official document indicating such plea of guilty or admission of violation, a copy of the judgment or other document indicating such conviction or finding and a copy of any applicable order of an appellate court or other appellate body, or a statement explaining such charge of falsely stating qualifications for membership, and a copy of this section. At the hearing the member may appear before the Executive Committee with legal counsel, may submit oral or written statements to the Executive Committee, may present written evidence to the Executive Committee, and may present witnesses to testify on the member's behalf before the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall have the right to cross-examine the member and any witnesses presented by the member on the member's behalf. At the member's option, the member may, by registered letter addressed to the President of the Association at Association headquarters, postmarked not less than ten (10) days prior to the date of the hearing, request the Executive Committee to consider the matter on the basis of a written statement by the member accompanying such a letter without the personal appearance of the member before the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee, if such oral or written statements, written evidence, or testimony of witnesses are presented, shall consider said statements, evidence, and testimony prior to voting on the suspension or expulsion of the member.

À member expelled from the Association under the procedure stated above shall be ineligible for reinstatement to membership unless reinstated by a unanimous vote of all members of the Executive Committee of the Association.

SECTION 9. Authority

Subject to the provisions of these Bylaws, the Executive Committee shall have primary authority over matters of professional conduct and discipline. No member, committee, Division, Section, or Region of the Association shall initiate or conduct any investigation or hearing or impose any sanction concerning the professional conduct of an Association member or applicant for Association membership, except as expressly permitted by these Bylaws. Procedures adopted by the Executive Committee as authorized by Section 1 of this Article XI shall be in accordance with, and subject to, the provisions of these Bylaws.

SECTION 10. Definition

The term "member" as used in this Article XI shall refer to a member of the Association of any classification.

SECTION 11. Publication of Grievance Matters

The Executive Director of the Association shall cause to be published annually in the Bulletin or by other suitable means a summary of all grievance proceedings initiated, pending, or considered each year. The summary shall include, but not be limited to, the general type of complaint, the level of grievance procedure attained, and status or disposition of the case. Names of parties shall not be published, except that the name of any member expelled from the Association shall be published in said summary.

ARTICLE XII. MEETINGS

The Association shall hold at least one (1) stated meeting of its members each year, at a time and place designated by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE XIII. DUES

SECTION 1. Fiscal Year

The fiscal year of the Association shall begin on July 1 and end on June 30 of the following calendar year.

SECTION 2. Dues Benefit

The payment of annual dues for any fiscal year entitles the Active Member, Emeritus Member, Student, or Associate to receive without further charge a copy of the Bulletin and the Explorer of the Association for that year.

SECTION 3. Dues Schedule and Billing

The annual dues of members shall be payable in advance of the fiscal year in accordance with a schedule to be established annually by the Executive Committee, provided that the dues shall not exceed the sums set forth below:

Active-Up to \$125

Emeritus-Up to \$62.50

Honorary-None

Student-Up to \$10

Associate—Up to \$125

The above schedule shall be subject to the following provisos:

- (a) That dues are not refundable;
- (b) That members having previously obtained exemption under the former Life Member category shall not be required to pay dues;
- (c) That students who join while undergraduates will be reclassified as Associates upon termination of academic enrollment or upon commencement of full-time professional employment or practice.
- (d) An Associate who has completed the degree requirements, but not the experience requirements, for Active membership shall pay one-half of the regular Active membership dues for not more than four (4) years while not having satisfied such experience requirements and shall pay regular Associate dues thereafter while an Associate.
- (e) There shall be three levels of annual dues for Active Members and Associates which shall be based on gross annual personal income in United States dollars. The levels are: Level 1–Annual income greater than \$50,000; Level 2–Annual income greater than \$50,000 but not more than \$50,000; and Level 3–Annual income of \$25,000 or less. Level 2 dues shall be one-half of Level 1 dues; Level 3 dues shall be one-fourth of Level 1 dues; provided, however, that in no event shall annual dues based on any level of annual income be less than \$20.00. An Active Member or an

Associate whose annual income is in Level 2 or Level 3 may, at his or her option, pay dues which correspond with any higher level of annual income. The Executive Committee may provide for access to the *Bulletin* and the *Explorer* by different means for persons paying different levels of dues.

- (f) Except as required to initiate the various dues levels as set out in subsection (e) above, that the annual change in dues for Active Members and Associates cannot exceed twenty percent (20%), and that this annual change is noncumulative; and
- (g) That a penalty to be established annually by the Executive Committee will be levied for each quarter year of delinquency beginning on July 1.

A statement shall be mailed to each Active Member, Emeritus Member, Honorary Member, Student, and Associate before July 1 of each year, stating the amount of annual dues.

SECTION 4. Arrears and Suspension

Any member of whatever classification whose dues are in arrears for more than sixty (60) days and for less than one (1) year shall be suspended from membership in the Association and shall not be entitled to the privileges of membership.

SECTION 5. Forfeit of Membership

Any member of whatever classification who is more than one (1) year in arrears in payment of dues shall forfeit membership in the Association and the member's name shall be removed from membership rolls.

ARTICLE XIV. AMENDMENTS

SECTION 1. Proposal of Amendments

Amendments to these Bylaws may be proposed by the following means:

- (a) Resolution by the Executive Committee;
- (b) Resolution of the House of Delegates;
- (c) Written proposal signed by fifty (50) members of the Association.
- (d) Resolution by a majority vote of the Officers of the House of Delegates and the Chairman of the Constitution and Bylaws Committee of the House of Delegates.

SECTION 2. Amending Procedure

- (a) Upon receipt of such proposals, they shall be referred to the Chairman of the House of Delegates, who shall then forward them to (a) the Executive Committee and (b) to the Constitution and Bylaws Committee of the House of Delegates for review and a report to be presented to the members of the House of Delegates, in accordance with its Rules & Procedures.
- (b) Amendments proposed by resolution of the Executive Committee, by resolution of a majority vote of the Officers of the House of Delegates and the Chairman of the Constitution and Bylaws Committee of the House of Delegates, or by fifty (50) members of the Association shall within thirty (30) days of their receipt by the Chairman of the House of Delegates be distributed to the Executive Committee, the members of the House of Delegates, the Constitution and Bylaws committee of the House of Delegates, the Advisory Council, and any committee or member(s) of the Association designated by the Executive Committee to receive them.
- (c) Each of the bodies and members receiving proposed amendments pursuant to Section 2, paragraph (a) above, may submit comments to the Constitution and Bylaws

committee of the House of Delegates not less than thirty (30) days prior to the annual meeting of the House of Delegates at which the proposed amendment is to be considered. The Chairman of the House of Delegates shall cause all such comments to be sent with the proposed amendment to the members of the House of Delegates prior to such annual meeting.

(d) Each of the bodies and members to receive proposed amendments under Section 2, paragraph (b) above, may submit comments concerning amendments proposed by resolution of the House of Delegates to the Constitution and Bylaws committee of the House of Delegates not later than the next October 31st following the adoption of the resolution. The Chairman of the House of Delegates shall cause all such comments to be sent with the proposed amendment to the members of the House of Delegates as provided in its Rules and Procedures.

SECTION 3. Publication of Amendments

The Executive Committee shall cause proposed amendments to be published in the Bulletin or by other suitable means at least ninety (90) days prior to the annual meeting of the House of Delegates.

SECTION 4. Consideration of Amendments

Proposed amendments shall be considered at the annual meeting of the House of Delegates and shall be passed upon receipt of a two-thirds (2/3) affirmative vote of the Delegates present and voting.

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
